Lumbering Era Show Is April 5

"Once More A-Lumbering Go" in song, picture and story will be presented in the Madonna College Student Center, April 5, at 2:30 p.m. Detroit residents, Mr. and Mrs. Max Greger and their daughter Susan will conduct the presentation.

Admission is \$1.25 adults, \$1 students. The show is built around Greger's paintings of early Michigan lumbering. Depicted as a riverman of the period, Greger will tell tall tales and sing songs of the lumberwoods and his characters. He will also explain the phases of logging illustrated in his paintings.

Susan will depict a Scottish lassie as a reminder of the influence of foreign peoples in the Michigan lumberwoods. To the accompaniment of her guitar she will sing traditional ballads and art songs popular among the ladies of the day.

Mrs. Greger will narrate the story in her role as a school-marm. Among the songs presented by the Gregers are ballads popular in the late 1800s in the lumbering areas particularly in the pine-rich Saginaw valley.

The repertoire includes such numbers as "Once More A-Lumbering Go," "The Lumberman's Alphabet," "Michigan-I-O," and "Fair and Tender Maidens."

Madonna College is located at Levan and Schoolcraft Roads in Livonia.

M*A*S*H Provides New Laugh Route

The high jinks that one brilliant young surgeon forgets the others will remember. Accept this basic premise before you pay your money to see the satire, M*A*S*H, and you can't help but spend the resulting two hours in merriment.

THERE IS a plot to this film, saga of three young surgeons - Donald Sutherland, Elliott Gould and Tom Skerritt - who spend five months at a Mobile Army Surgical Hospital (MASH) located just three miles behind the line of combat during the Korean War.

Supporting actors appear as fellow surgeons, enlisted men, and a bevy of nurses. The chief nurse (Sally Kellerman) at the hospital is

NOTHING is sacred in this film. The Army rules and regulations, religion, the draft - Korean style, and sex all come under the gun of the satire. The scene flips from the operating room complete with its share of gory wounds and operations to the mess hall and the officers' tents with dazzling speed.

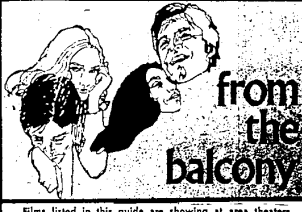
West said his untitled film is "simply an introduction to the whole spectrum of man and environment. It has no an-

swers but does pose the problem that faces us all.

"This film presents the interpretations of an internationally-known ecologist and conservationist, Dr. Eugene P. Odum of the University of Georgia. It is a stimulus for consideration of a master plan for the total environment and for a holding operation for lands that contain irreplaceable natural resources until such time as they can be permanently preserved."

CLIFFORD and Eleanor West have produced many films in the time arts. Mrs. West's films include research and narration for a film of Ericsson art in cooperation with the University of Michigan. She is also an author and a painter.
