Area gymnast wins state crown sport shorts

Gymnastics is a test of physical prowess, to be sure. But a certain psychological ability is also necessary if the gymnast is to be-successful.

The sport is one of precision. One erroneous move can cost the competitor

roneous move can cost the competitor a bundle of points.
Realizing this made Canton's Todd Olson a trifle uneasy as he prepared for the U.S. Gymnastics Federation (USGF) Boy's State Championships. But the 14-year-old knew how to handle the situation.

"I just pretended it (the state meet)
was just like practice, and I went out
there and did it," deadpanned Olson,
who trains four days a week at Go-Fer
Gymnastics in Canton under the coaching of Ron and Cindy Westerman.

His family lived in Novi at the time and Olson played baseball and hockey.

and floor exercise and a third in the vault. Olson placed in all seven events in the 13-15 boys' age group.

"It felt great to do well," Olson said.
"I was surprised." Olson's performance was not as big a surprise to Westerman. "We're maybe a touch surprised," Westerman said.

"But we look back at it and say, 'He but a lot do work into it. He hit on his routines here (in practice), so why cart' Olson's composure and ability of overcome nervosusess in a meet of this statuge earned Westerman's praise.

But after three mohas in the class, the Olsons moved to Canton and Todd was forced to give up his sport for 14 years. His parents debated whether he should commute back to his old class in Novi or search for something closer to home when they discovered Go-Fer Gymnastics, which opened in March, 1881.

THE GO—FER Gymnastics club, in its first year of USGF competition, has nine male and more than 70 female members. The boys' team is divided into three age groups, ranging from six to 15 years. The girls divisions are separated by skill instead of age.

The Go-Fer girls competed as a team in the state meet, but there were not enough boys to be a factor in the team standings.

The Go-Fer girls competed as a team in the state meet. Olson's firsts were a big lift for the boys' team, and Dawn Cooper won the uneven parallel bars with a 9.15 point score in an earlier competition for the girls' squad. Cooper finished seventh in the all-around.

So, as Olson and Cooper develop their talent, the Go-Fer team should also improve. That makes the outlook for Olson, Cooper, the Westermass and the Go-Fer teams a bright one indeed.
