Debbie Pothoff's piano students will be giving their recital in Presbyterian Village this fall.

"Recitals for an adequate room with a good piano are increasingly high, and those in nursing home are asking for entertainment. I think I've come up with a good solution for everybody," Pothoff said.

Saving the expense of renting a room and at the same time giving entertainment to shut-ins is a suggestion the Farmington Hills resident wants to pass on to other teachers for consideration.

For many years the piano teacher would record Christmas music on tape, gather up a few friends and go caroling to local nursing homes.

"But Christmas isn't the only time these people need entertainment," she said. "The staff (at Presbyterian Village) not only thought the idea a good one, but is going to make a party out of it for their residents."

There is yet another advantage Pothoff sees in scheduling the recital for nursing home residents.

"My students won't have a built-in audience of parents and grandparents and friends cheering them on. This will be an audience of strangers, a new experience for most of them," she said.

Pothoff gives piano lessons in her home and has about 30 students, 10 of whom are adults.

The recital is set for 2 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 15 in Presbyterian Village, 25300

Six Mile Road, two blocks east of Beech Daly. Admission is free.

"So many of my students have dance recitals or end-of-the-year concerts or

shows they are preparing for in June. I give them a break and settle for a fall date for the piano recital," she said of the last four recitals she's planned.
