

'Concrete Jungle' filled with cliches on life behind bars

If there is an original idea in "The Concrete Jungle" (R), it must be encased in the concrete. This movie about a women's prison repeats every cliche you've ever seen in prison movies. The only shopworn incident that is mising is the prison break. Maybe omitting it constitutes an origi-nal idea.

Nothing clicks in this movie and nothing holds up to scruting. Tracy Bregman plays the supposedly innocent victim of a frame-up. Tinnocent' because, without her knowledge, her boyfriend hid cocaine in her skis as a way of getting the drug carried into the United States.

She was caught going through customs and quicker than you can say "track," she landed in prison.

"SUPPOSEDLY INNOCENT," because you have to wonder about how easily she accepts the fact that her bortriend is smuggling cocaine. How did she think he was earning a living? There is nothing to suggest he had a job.

Nevertheless, we are supposed to regard her as a noble person because she will not reveal her boyfriend's name to the authorities. The result is that she gets the slammer and he gets to roam free, jok up other girls and try again. He does visit her now and then, just to continue professing his love while urging her not to reveal his name.

All this time, she is being abused and mistreated by other in-lates and the prison staff. Heading the prison staff is Jill St. John

mates and the prison statt. Heaung the parts of the warf.

This has to be the worst miscasting of the year, maybe the decade. Wardrobe has dressed her in mannish clothes and given her glasses, but to no avail. She looks like a warden the way Marlon Brando looks like a ballet dancer.

Perhaps such offbeat casting ware meant to be comical; the movie does flirt with the comic. Unfortunately, I don't believe laughter was really intended. For example, there is the time that Elizabeth (Bregman) is assaulted by two lumates. She dispatches them with an amazing display of martial arts prowess.

WHERE DID THIS sweet innocent person learn to fight like that? There isn't a hint that she possesses such knowledge, skill or physical fitness. Also, she doesn't ever do anything to make anyone think she is smart, bet in this movie she is always referred to as mart. On the contrary, everything she is involved in, from her boytrined's decelifulness to her scrapes inside prison, suggest someone whose cornflakes have gone soggy.

At the center of all lilegal and immoral activity within the prison is an immate known as Cat (Barbara Luna), She and the corrupt warden are working together to make hig bucks off drug traffic within the prison.

Cat struts around and an entourage of nervous underlings. She doesn't seem to do anything more demanding than lighting a cigarcette, yet when she is attacked, she also reveals all kinds of skills in hand-to-hand combat.

Whether "The Concrete Jungle" was meant to be an action-exploitation movie or a social drama about the need for prison reform, it is so trite it falls on both levels. Where it succeeds is in bringing together poor writing, poor acting, poor directing and poor editing.

The result is a poor movie.

Humans who touch the crystal slowly and agoniz-ingly petrity.






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
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
