## 'Penzance' Opens At U-M

On April 15 the University of Gilbert and Sullivan Society "surfaces" again with a gentle political satire from the pens of Sir William Schwenk Gilbert and Sir Arthur Sullivan.

For its fifth season production last December, the society staged a lively and well-received production of "H.M.S. Pinafore." This semester the group goes deck with a production of "Pirates of Penzance."

"Pirates," both thematically and chronologically, can be considered a sequel to "Pinafore."

As in the other G & S works, "Pirates" is all satire. In "Pinafore," the target was naval discipline. This time, Gilbert and Sullivan transfer their barbs to land, and the jibes are on the army and the police.

Most of the main characters are direct descendants of "Pinafore." Thus, Sir Joseph, K.C.B., becomes the Modern Major General, Lord Stanley; the thematic relationship between the high-born Captain's daughter, Josephine, and her love for the low-born sailor, Ralph Rackstraw, carry over into the love between the orphan pirate Frederick and Mabel, who is Major Stanley's principle ward; and Little Buttercup is transformed into the

# Dance Power: Redlich Has Multi-Media Show

When people think of ballet the image of the stereotyped productions of "Swan Lake" is often a common reaction. The members of the Don Redlich Dance Company don't fit this image.

The company will appear in concert at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 15, in the Detroit Institute of Arts Program under the sponsorship of the Detroit Metropolitan Dance Project.

A CASUAL EXAMINATION of the props required for the concert should convince you that the Redlich performance won't be anything close to the stereotypes.

Included on the prop list are the following: one 30-inch stool; two 18-inch stools; 150 pounds of torn newspaper; three galvanized pails; a 15 square foot cargo net; a 15 projector with a cinemascope lens; two tape recorders; six 20 by 20 foot plastic sheets; five gallons of latex paint in assorted colors; and four 50-foot lengths of hemp rope.

Unusual props? Maybe that's why Redlich has been called one of modern dance's "most progressive and experimental choreographers."

The company has the reputation of using a multi-media approach to dance.

REDLICH is recipient of a National Foundation for the Arts grant for his "Slouching towards Bethlehem," one of the numbers to be performed in the Detroit concert and the dance that requires many of the above props.

The concert program will also include: Jibes, Air Antique; Alice and Henry; Couplet; Tabloid; Caboots; and Dance for One Figure, Four Objects and Film Sequence.

Appearing with Redlich will be Elina Mooney and Lulu Santangelo who have been on concert tours with him throughout the United States and in Europe.

A native of Minnesota, Redlich presented his first concert in 1958. His many dance teachers include Martha Graham and Hanya Holm. A choreographer of musicals and television specials, he has been artist-in-residence at the University of Wisconsin and has been teaching regularly at Sarah Lawrence College and Adelphi University.

TICKETS, to the concert are available at Grinnell's, Hudson's and the Art Institute. Student tickets are also on sale at Oakland Community College and Wayne State University.
