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ARTHRITIS TODAY
What is Wear and Tear Arthritis?
The most common form of arthritis is osteoarthritis, often called "wear and tear" arthritis.

This form is apt. In osteoarthritis the smooth ends of the bone - the cartilage - becomes worn down and pitted. When this loss of cartilage becomes great enough, movement of the joint causes bone to rub against bone. The result is a painful joint.

The most common site for osteoarthritis is the knee though any joint may be affected. The individual usually feels well on arising, but on walking pain builds up so that by evening the joint throbs with pain. Physicians make a diagnosis of osteoarthritis by the pattern of pain, examination of the joints, and from X-rays which show the features of joint strain.

Since treatment is available, you should be evaluated by your personal physician or a rheumatologist, if you believe you may have osteoarthritis.

Mezzo soprano takes grand opera honors

Carol Madalin, a 25-year-old mezzo soprano from Farmington, has won the \$1,000 Elizabeth Hodges Donovan Memorial Award in the Detroit Grand Opera Association's auditions.

Madalin, who is a student of Hene Deneen, took one of four awards given to help and encourage young singers in their careers. The Donovan award is for advanced study in voice and operatic training.

Madalin was the recipient of the Henry E. Wenger Memorial Awards two seasons ago and was a Michigan Opera Theatre intern for its 1980 season.

She is an apprentice with the Chicago Lyric Opera Company. At the Lyric, she has performed in "Tosca" and "Die Fledermaus." She has appeared with the Detroit Symphony, the Grand Rapids Symphony and Western Michigan Opera.

Madalin's win makes her eligible to participate in the Metropolitan Opera's Great Artists Regional auditions, which will be held in Toronto in February.

Mrs. Sam B. Williams of Bloomfield Hills heads the Detroit Grand Opera Association's auditions programs. Among this year's judges was the internationally renowned soprano, Anna Moffo.
