

City Stiffens Laws On Drugs, Loitering

FARMINGTON

The City of Farmington has adopted three new ordinances to deal with the problems of littering near drive-in restaurants, drug abuse and disorderly persons around school buildings.

The three additions, plus amendments updating the city's traffic code, were recommended by Public Safety Director Robert Deadman.

THE DRIVE-IN restaurant ordinance gives police authority to control conduct of persons on property adjacent to drive-in restaurants.

Deadman explains several store owners requested action against persons who buy food at a drive-in restaurant and then eat on an adjacent parking lot. Police now will be able to disperse such crowds.

The drug abuse ordinance prohibits possession of hypodermic needles, syringes and similar equipment by persons who do not have a legitimate use for them.

Before adoption of this measure, hypodermic needles and

syringes could be purchased and possessed without prescription by anyone.

Similar ordinances are in effect in Bloomfield, Berkeley and Sterling Heights, said Deadman. He added that in the past three months, his department has confiscated five pieces of equipment employed by drug users.

THE THIRD ORDINANCE carefully spells out who may be in a school building and how guests may receive permission to be in a school and it defines the term "student" more precisely, says Deadman.

This law will help police insure order around school buildings by controlling unwanted guests on school property, Deadman adds.

Previously, the department could control school problems with the city's trespass ordinance. The action was needed, he said, because schools have had trouble with expelled students or non-students hanging around inside school buildings.

Under provisions of the ordinance, worked out with school officials, a guest must notify the building principal that he is visiting upon arriving.

The guest will receive a pass which must be shown to a police officer if requested.

RECIPIENT of the license was Gail Nau, who plans to develop a Sno-White Dining Room restaurant in the service center of the Township-Brown developed industrial park.

Nau, a resident of Canterbury Commons and son of a Detroit restaurant family, says the proposed restaurant will seat 200 and will serve breakfast, lunch and dinner.

There will be a carport area to provide hot lunches to workers from the factories and warehouses in the industrial park who will also provide a valeting service to clients located in the park, Nau added.

The restaurant, which will feature an Early American decor, will have a total worth of about \$466,000. Nau said he hopes construction will start in August with the doors opening in late fall.

He said it will be a high-class restaurant with moderate prices which will serve the community as well as the industrial park.

SUPERVISOR HALL said the request met the township's policy on granting liquor li-

censes because the total investment was over \$500,000, and serving liquor was incidental to the food business.

A representative from Thompson-Brown stated that it would not be feasible to develop the balance of the service center without the restaurant, and the restaurant could not operate without the liquor license.

Mrs. Elise Avery said she felt Sno-White would be an asset to the community.

"Announcement was made April 8 by Thompson-Brown that ground breaking ceremonies for the service center at the industrial park would be held April 16."
