Baker Expects Vote Lag

FARMINGTON State Rep. Raymond L. Baker (R-Farmington) says a vote on additional state income tax to finance school aid may be delayed until after the Aug. 4 primary for political reasons.

Baker says Governor William Milliken did not include the school aid bill and its companion tax measure on a list of legislation he wants settled this month.

"That omission on the Governor's part fueled speculation that a decision voted on the income tax bill (Senate Bill 1084) might be delayed until after the Aug. 4 primary, as a vote for higher taxes could be a critical factor in the re-election plans of the 118 members of the Legislature," Baker says in the release.

BAKER SAYS the \$1.2 billion school aid bill (Senate Bill 1082) amended by the House, is now resting in the Senate.

The Farmington Republican says supporters of the school aid vote will also win passage of the tax bill which would hike state income taxes by about 35 per cent in order to assure an additional \$342 million for the 1970-71 school aid financing.

"This being election year, it is unthinkable that all of those legislators who voted for this huge increase will also vote the necessary taxes to pay for it. Some of the lawmakers who backed the sponsors on the

school aid vote went off-the-hook on the tax question," Baker comments.

Farmington's representative in the Legislature voted against the school aid bill.

BAKER SAYS Milliken has asked the leadership of the House and Senate to move swiftly on bills concerning the following subjects:

—Civil lawsuits against air polluters. The measure, pending in the House, would enable residents to file civil lawsuits against polluters, Baker says.

—An increased state minimum wage. Baker says an administration-backed bill to raise the minimum wage from \$1.30 per hour to \$1.60 per hour has passed the house and is now pending in the Senate Labor Committee.

—A major overhaul of the state's abortion law. The Farmington Republican says the Senate Committee on Health, Social Services and Retirement is preparing enabling legislation with the administration's backing.

The law, he says, would make such operations a "matter of conscience" between a woman and her doctor, providing she has been a resident for at least three months and conceived within that time.

—A state commission on investigations. Baker says enabling bills are being readied in both houses for a crime fighting unit with wide-ranging authority to study public and private corruption.
