"Kish is a great quarterback, maybe the best ever to play at Harrison," asid Herrington after the game.


Lakeland, whose first-team defense has allowed only one TD this season, stopped Harrison on what looked like a sure score near the end of the first half. The Hawks, with Miller leading the way, drove to the Eagle nine where they faced a fourth-and-one situation. Herrington decided to go for it with a Blackmer plunge rather than a field
