

Metalsmith wins EMU competition

Mark Reed of White Plains Drive, Farmington Hills, has been awarded one of two \$500 top prizes in "Metalsmithing: the Michigan Influence," an exhibit at Eastern Michigan University's Ford Gallery through Nov. 24.

Read's "Taxonomy," a sculpture in stainless steel, fur and ivory, was awarded the prize by jurors Alain Joyaux of the Flint Institute of Art, John Paul Miller of the Cleveland Art Institute, and Richard Thomas of the Cranbrook Academy of Art. Bloomfield Hills' Reed is a nationally known metalsmith.

The show, co-sponsored by EMU and the Michigan Silversmiths Guild, is the first competitive exhibition of the works of Michigan metalsmiths. All of

the participating artists are current or former residents of the state.

Read holds a bachelor of fine arts degree from the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit, and a master of fine arts degree from Cranbrook. He has been exhibiting his work since 1969. Currently, he is creating a trophy for excellence in design for the General Motors Corp.

"Taxonomy" and another work of Reed's are on display with the works of more than 50 other artists in "Metalsmithing: the Michigan Influence."

Ford Gallery is located in Ford Hall near Cross Street on the EMU campus; the exhibition is free and open to the public. Gallery hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.
