Cereal removed after staple find

Eighteen-ounce boxes of Super Sugar Cereal have been removed from the shelves of a local supermarket after a staple was found in one batch of the cereal purchased at the store.
The boxes of Super Sugar Cereal were removed from the Great Scott supermarket at 13 Mile and Orchard Lake roads, Farmington Hills.

James Roberts, 26, of 31990 Highway reported the discovery of a staple in the bowl of cereal his 8-year-old daughter Jennifer poured on Wednesday.
Roberts told police the box was purchased at Great Scott sometime within the last two weeks.

Scott's Bob Ranusch, who said all 18-ounce packages of the Post product would be taken off the shelves.
"It's most likely an isolated incident. This is the first we've heard of an incident like this, but after investigating I'm sure we'll find it's simply one of a kind," said a spokesman from General Foods' (Post's parent company) New York headquarters.
Post Cereals, based in Battle Creek, is "extremely well-prepared for contingencies such as these, and has been since well prior to the Tylenol killings," he added. (Seven deaths resulted recently in the Chicago area when cyanide-laced Extra Strength Tylenol capsules were consumed by the victims).

POST PRIDES itself on "extremely good quality control measures which include metal detectors capable of picking up even a single staple," the spokesman said.
The incident puzzled a Great Scott manager who declined to be identified.
"I've toured the Post cereals plant, and the closest a staple comes to the cereals is across the street in the main building. They have the need for staples there. They use glue for the boxes and (to construct) the cases they're packed in.
"I don't understand what goes through people's minds. It's just bizarre," he said.
"There's enough flaky people out there; it's unreal."

Failure to open approaches to boxes promptly after heavy snows may temporarily prevent carriers from making deliveries. Postmaster Harris said that postal regulations also require that walks, steps and porches be kept cleared of snow and ice.

Keep snow cleared from the mail box

Farmington Postmaster Kenneth B. Harris reminds all customers that postal regulations regarding delivery of mail require customers to keep the approach to their mailbox cleared of snow.
This will permit the carrier to drive up to the mailbox to deposit and to collect mail without leaving his vehicle.
The approach to the exit from the mailbox should be cleared suffi-

ciently on both sides to allow the carrier to drive ahead and not be required to back up his vehicle after delivery.

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
