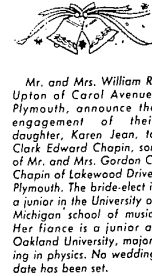

Sex Education Is Subject For TV Series

"What's all this business about sex education, anyway?" seems to be a question more and more frequently asked. Some of the answers may be gained by watching "Sons & Daughters," a weekly television series on WTVS, Channel 56 beginning Wednesday, April 22, at 7:30 p.m.

It will be co-sponsored by The Merrill-Palmer Institute and The YWCA of Metropolitan Detroit.

THE SERIES entitled, "Sons & Daughters," will be shown over WTVS, Channel 56, beginning Wednesday, April 22, at 7:30 p.m.

The half-hour programs were originally produced by the public television station in Hershey, Pa., and will be underwritten in this area by the Merrill-Palmer Institute and the YWCA.

Several awards for excellence have been made to the producers for this series which is intended to illustrate just what sex education is, by the

way of programs that are sex education in brief. The series is suitable for all ages and family groups.

Immediately following the fifth program will be a half-hour of locally-produced time which will deal with questions most frequently sent in by viewers upon invitations extended during the first four programs in the series.

Student Leaders To Hear Governor

Student Leaders from Michigan High Schools will meet Gov. William G. Milliken and hear him give the keynote address at the eighth annual Michigan Governor's Conference on Student Leadership at Oakland University in Rochester Friday, April 24.

The double-barrel program will involve 450 student leaders at the same time that 65 adult directors of student activities will meet to discuss the needs of today's student.

THE CONFERENCE is being sponsored by the Division of Continuing Education at Oakland University, in cooperation with Gov.
