Tough luck rode with Rick Orlandoni and the Garden City East baseball team in its Mid-West League opener.

Although Orlandoni gave up only one hit, he was beaten, 1-0, as East got off on the wrong foot in its bid for a fourth straight league crown.

Ironically, the lone safety didn't figure in the game's

only run. A walk, followed by errors helped Taylor score. Orlandoni fanned 10 and was matched in a brilliant pitching duel with Taylor's Rick Lee.

EAST BOUNCED back to beat Inker's 6-4, after falling behind, 3-0, in the first inning.

Orlandoni rescued Greg Puares with one out in the

sixth inning and set down four of the five men he faced on strikes.

Franklin High's baseball team tuning up for the Northwest Suburban League season this week, swept past Northville in a doubleheader, 5-2 and 6-5.

Hits by Frank Kasperek, Redoutey and Allen, plus a walk to Randy Lee, an error and a sacrifice by Grills finished the Franklin scoring in the sixth.

Jim Bruneto, Duffey, Giblin and Jones made up the Rice 4-0-yard relay which placed fifth.

Another Rice fourth was scored in the distance medley with Jim Kramer, John Belknap, Pete Wagner and Tome Hurler carrying the baton.

Rice was third in the mile relay in which Carter, Jim Miller, Rick Costantino competed.

Russ Monahan, Carter and Kevin Callahan gave Rice a fifth in the high jump relay, while Carter, Bruneto and Jones leaped Rice to a third in the high jump relay.

Southfield came up with only one point in the meet, taking a fifth in the mile relay.

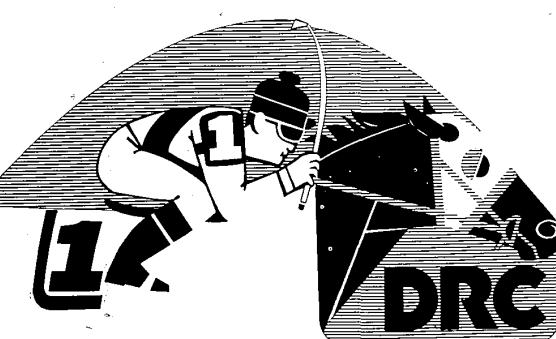
North Farmington came up with 13 points to place seventh in the annual Brother Rice relay carnival.
