

## 4-H Grants Offered Home Economic Majors

Six \$600 scholarships have been offered by the National 4-H service committee to present or former 4-H members planning to major in home economics as college juniors. Applicants for the grants must have been 4-H members for at least three years. They must be enrolled in the fall of 1970 at an accredited college or university toward a major in home economics.

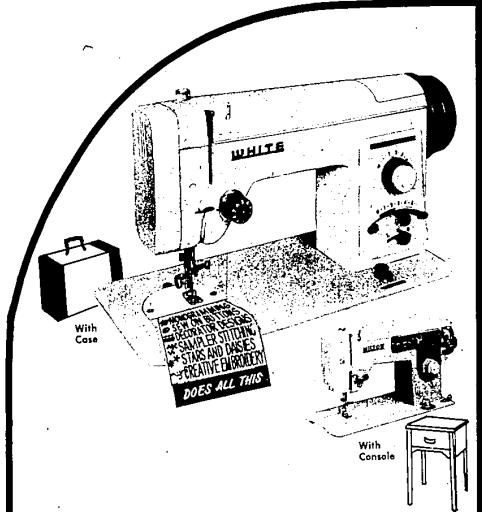
TWO SCHOLARSHIPS are donated by each of the following: The S&H Foundation, Inc., New York; The West Bend Company, West Bend, Wisconsin; and Sunbeam Corporation, Chicago. S&H also is sponsor of the national 4-H home improvement program which currently enrolls 200,000 youth between the ages of nine and 19.

Each state may submit the

application of one girl to be considered for the six grants. Her 4-H and scholastic record will be judged in early November by the cooperative extension service, the scholarship program administrators.

Coeds interested may get applications from the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service, 5455 S. Wayne, Wayne, 721-6550.

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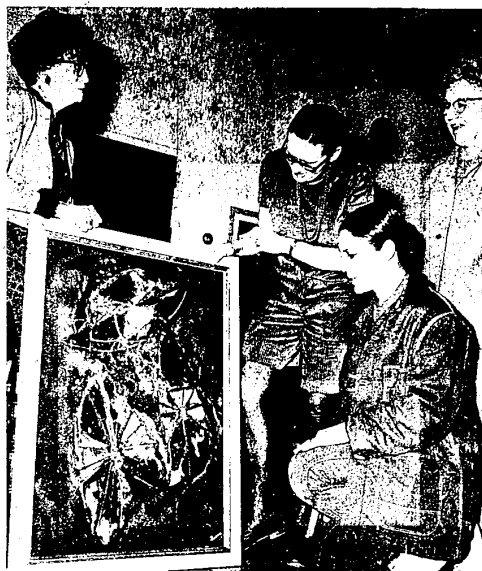
