

Raiders riddle reeling Falcons

North Farmington claims city championship

The Raiders of North Farmington claimed the city basketball title Tuesday night with a 51-48 victory over cross-town, non-league opponent Farmington High. North defeated Farmington Harrison earlier in the season.

North dominated the entire first half of Tuesday's game leading 19-8 at the end of the first quarter and 29-12 at the end of the second quarter. Farmington came back with 16 and 20 points in the third and fourth quarters, respectively, while the Raiders tallied 10 and 12 points in the second half.

Ray Boyle led the Raiders with 14 points, while John Dawson added 12. Mike Black and Will Reineke contributed 10 points each. Reineke also had six rebounds as did Marly Shoberg.

Dan Zang, with 14 points, and Tim Carruthers, with 10, paced the Falcons.

Guards Boyle and Black picked up 12 steals for North, according to assistant coach Robert Henderhan. Black also collected 10 assists.

North is 5-6 overall and 1-4 in the Northwest Suburban League. The squad travels to Detroit County Day for an 8 p.m. game Friday.

JOHN FRIZZELL sank a free throw with no time remaining Tuesday night

to give Orchard Lake St. Mary a 45-44 overtime basketball win over non-league opponent Mt. Clemens Cardinal Mooney.

Frizzell led the Eagles with 17 points in the game, while teammate Steve Tompkins added 16. Ken Ullery led all scorers that night with 20 for the Cardinals.

St. Mary is now 5-6 overall and 3-3 in its Catholic League A-East Division. The squad travels to Center Line St. Clement for a league game on Friday.

The score at the end of regulation time in Tuesday's contest was tied 42-42. St. Mary added three in the two-minute overtime period and held the Cardinals to two points.

The Eagles went up 46-42 at the end of the first quarter and held on by one point at the half, 44-43. The third quarter score was 36-22, St. Mary.

St. Mary's win avenged a 42-39 loss to Cardinal Mooney last December.

SOUTHFIELD HIGH out rebounded non-league basketball for Willow Run 48-19 Tuesday night to win 63-57.

Mike McCaskill pulled in 20 rebounds to lead the Blue Jays. He also dumped in 16 points. Charlie Hart

grabbed 14 rebounds and scored 14 points. Teammate Joey Walton scored 16 points for Southfield.

The win gives Southfield a 9-1 overall record. The squad is 7-0 in the Southeastern Michigan Association.

The Blue Jays led 16-12 at the end of the first quarter Tuesday. The squad then held a 31-27 margin at the half and 47-45 at the end of the third quarter. Southfield added 16 in the final quarter and Willow Run scored 12.

The Blue Jays were 25-0-55 from the field while Willow Run was 25-54. Southfield also hit on 13-0-25 free

throws and Willow Run was 7-10. Southfield's foe on Friday is league school Hazel Park.

SOUTHFIELD CHRISTIAN scored a season high 90 points Tuesday night to defeat Michigan Independent Athletic Conference opponent Huron Valley Lutheran, 90-63.

Southfield is now 6-0 overall and 7-2 in the conference. The squad travels to Lutheran Northwest for another league game Friday.

The Eagles were paced in scoring by senior forward Dan Severn with 23 points. Junior forward Chris Seavey

added 15 and Doug Dietzman 13 points. Teammates Tim Woll and John Devine contributed six assists for Southfield. Ron Briggs was high scorer for Huron with 19 points.

The Eagles went in front 18-13 at the end of the first quarter and upped the margin to 42-25 at the intermission. The Eagles added 25 points in the third quarter and 23 more in the fourth, while holding Huron to 12 and 26 points in the second half.

The Eagles grabbed 31 rebounds compared to Huron's 19. The squad was also 16-of-21 from the free-throw line and 37-70 from the field. Huron was 11-17 at the foul line and 26-68 from the field.

HARRISON High School kept Redford Union winless with a 53-44 non-league victory Tuesday evening. Harrison is 3-7 overall while RU is 0-11.

Harrison led 17-7 at the end of the first quarter and 25-20 at the half. The Hawks added to their lead, 39-30, at the end of the third period. Both teams finished the game with 14 points in the fourth quarter.

Junior forward Dave Quarles paced Harrison with 12 points. Senior forward Wes Jones had 11 points and 12 rebounds for the Hawks, while senior center Mike McDonald added 14 rebounds. Keith Ruloff, with 17, and Pat Lowmyer, with 12, led the winless Panthers.

Cyclist peddling for '84 Olympics

The U.S. Olympic team is looking for a few good cyclists.

"That's why 24-year-old Jeff Pierce of Livonia is going through 'basic training' at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Pierce, a 1982 Michigan State University graduate, is a four-time state cycling champion and two-time U.S. National Team member. He was a bronze medalist last year at both the National Sports Festival and U.S. Championships.

"I'm laying the foundation down for the season," said Pierce, who will train at the site until March. "This is a good program for fitness. It's good for everybody because it's a long cycling season."

"We do weightlifting, play volleyball and racquetball, attend aerobics classes and do light cycling (40-60 miles per day). The altitude is great because it makes the body work harder. It's a great place this time of year. There hasn't been any snow and the temperature has been in the 40s to 50s."

PIERCE is primarily an individual road racer, but also has competed in the four-man Olympic team time trial events.

"I'm more suited to road racing," he said. "The distances are from 120-125 miles whereas there's more strategy involved in team time trial and the distance is much shorter (60 miles)."

His 1983 goals are to race in the Pan

American Games this summer in Caracas, Venezuela, then travel to Switzerland for the World Championships.

"I think my chances are fairly good," said Pierce. "The training here should really help because usually in the winter I've gone to school."

Now I'm concentrating solely on cycling and training."

Pierce, who graduated from MSU with a degree in business management, is sponsored in Colorado Springs by the Miller High-Life Brewing Co. When he's not at the camp, Schwinn, a well-known bicycle manufacturer, takes care of his living expenses.

"I'm racing full-time — 10 hours a day," said Pierce. "I've also spent some time in Phoenix riding and training. I've been on the Schwinn national team for eight years and I'm the captain of a five-man team."

The U.S. Olympic program is directed by Eddie Borysewicz, who is aided by 10 of the finest cycling coaches in the country. A native of Poland, Borysewicz is preparing Pierce and other promising cyclists for the Tour de Texas March 1 in Austin.

Mayor Hughes opened the Regular Meeting of the City Council of Farmington Hills on January 24, 1983, at 7:30 P.M. Members present were: Burwell, Hughes, Scronen, Williams, Lange and Wolf. Absent: Dolan. Others present were: City Manager Savage, Assistant City Manager Costick, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

The Mayor proclaimed January 22 through 28, 1983, National Junior Achievement Week of Farmington Hills and presented Mr. Jones a Junior Achievement Proclamation.

The minutes of December 20, 1982 and January 10, 1983 were approved as corrected.

Council approved the Project Plan for Dynamic Construction Project, Economic Development Corporation Resolution #4.

Holiday Inn of Farmington was denied exemption from City Code Amendment C-3-82, Coin Operated Amusement Devices.

Council enacted Zoning Map Amendment C62-250 (ZL 12-10-82) to rezone two lots at 23527 and 23515 Grand River from D-3 to L-1.

Council enacted Zoning Map Amendment C62-291 (ZL13-10-82) to rezone land at 21130 and 21126 Haggerty Road from RA-1 to Expressway Service.

Council recommended \$15,000 for paving project on Inlander Road, north of 14 Mile Road, contingent upon additional cost assumed by West Bloomfield, Bloomfield or the Road Commission.

Council approved request from Tally Hall Tavern Inc. to include Rojo, Inc. as co-licensor.

Consideration of renewal of a business license for Grand Haggerty Auto, Inc. was deleted from the agenda.

Council appointed Subcommittee of Lange, Wolf and Burwell to interview applicants for Energy Committee and Cable TV Access Committee and report back to Council.

An Executive Session following the regular meeting to discuss purchase of property was approved.

Debt-covenant was granted applicant for special assessment installment No. 6 for SAD 105 Barlow-Burbank Sewer and installment No. 4 for SAD 145 Oakland Hills Orchard Water.

Council adopted Resolution to provide for investment policy analysis of the Pension System by Merrill Lynch in \$400 per year.

Resolution was adopted approving extension of completion date for Farmington Ridge Subdivision to January 27, 1984.

Council approved Traffic Control Orders P-51-1983, S-24-73, ST-101-1982, Y-227-1982, Y-233-1983 and Y-234-1983. Five other Traffic Control orders were postponed until February 14, 1983.
