Michigan State Police troopers and
representatives from local law enforcement agencies, is housed at 31
Oakland Ave. Pontiae.
Commissioners last December eliminated the controversial task force from
the county budget.

Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson, a Republican, originally operated the crime force from his county offices. But the task force was later removed from Patterson's office after the prosecutor complained (if was becoming too controversial.

The crime force had been steeped in controversy between Democrats and Republicans when it allegedly failed to make significant gains in curbing organized crime while causing friction between prosecutors, the sheriff's department and the Ponliac Police Department.

"There are 100,000 missing children in the United States," County Executive Daniel T. Murphy told the Republican caucus last week.


"Everybody across the country is going to get into this program," he said. "We should consider a countywide (ini-tiative)."

out to the schools and do the fingerprinting. It would be cheaper than hiring people for \$35,000 a year."



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
