Tips could save a life

With temperatures falling, surviving in the open water means not only staying afloat, but also conserving body heat. The U.S. Coast Guard has compiled some tips that could save your life in a "Pocket Guide to Cold Water Survival." If you're involved in a cold-water accident, try to make your entry into the water gradual rather than abrupt. For example, stay with a sinking boat as long as there's anything left to hang onto, and keep as much of your body out of the water as possible.

A sudden plunge into icy water can send your breathing rate up uncontrollably, causing you to take water into your lungs. If there's no way to avoid a jump or fall, keep your elbows at your sides, cover your nose and mouth with one hand, and hold that wrist or elbow with the other hand.

Once you're in the water, the danger of drowning is compounded by the threat of hypothermia — a condition where your body loses heat at its core, with effects ranging from numbness and disorientation to unconsciousness and death. To maintain body heat, you need to trap the small amount of water that's inside your clothing and let it warm up. So button up immediately. And don't swim any farther than the closest object you can hang onto (swimming pumps the warmer water out of your clothes and lets colder water in).

Jaycettes fight Cystic Fibrosis

This year Feb. 12-20 is proclaimed as "Kiss Your Baby Week" by the Michigan Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. The Farmington Jaycettes join the foundation to extend public awareness and education, and raise funds needed to support its research and care programs.

A "Mr. Legs" Contest is held annually to raise money for CF and by voting for the best-looking legs (of the Jaycettes) on a local, district, state and national level. The Farmington Jaycettes' "Mr. Legs," Tom Gaskin, won the district contest by earning the most money (and votes) for Cystic Fibrosis. So he advanced to the state judging on Feb. 12 in Kalamazoo.

Since 1960, it is estimated that more than 2,200 babies have been born with cystic fibrosis in Michigan. About one third of these children are not identified and, therefore, not receiving the care they need. CF is an incurable, lung-damaging disease.

Through the "Kiss Your Baby" program, parents are alerted to the sign of CF: a salty-tasting perspiration. They are urged to kiss their child with special attention. If the salty taste is present, have the child checked by a doctor.

The Farmington Jaycettes are distributing posters and fliers throughout

our community — in pediatricians' offices, in many drugstores, in 17 nursery schools and day care centers, and in the Farmington Community Library's two branches. They hope to reach thousands of parents in this important educational project so that undiagnosed CF children in Michigan will have a greater chance of an extended life.

For the last four years, Jaycette chapters throughout Michigan have endorsed the "Kiss Your Baby" program. Last year alone more than 500,000 dollars were distributed and thousands of dollars raised to give financial support to the foundation and CF children. 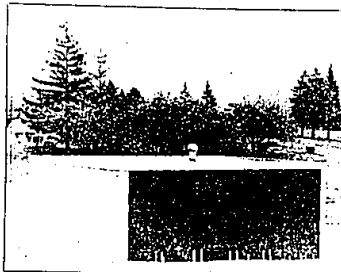
