FARMINGTON Farmington gymnasts returned from Jenison Field House at Michigan State University last Saturday with both individual and team victories. They competed there in the state finals of the Michigan Association of Gymnastics.

Though only five of his boys took part, Coach Dennis Fitzgerald's North Farmington group managed to capture the senior team championship. Bill Page took a first in all-around, and Rick Page paced his brother with a first in trampoline.

Others who placed in all-around were Don Chapman, second; Jim Bach, sixth; and Larry Bies, tenth. Mrs. Sandra Lubieniec's O.E.W. Duckel Warriors are state junior champions with 88

points. Diane McCallum is individual state champion in floor exercise and Gina Bregni first ranking queen of the uneven parallel bars. Diane also rated fifth in tumbling, sixth on balance beam, uneven parallel bars, and all-around.

LYNN SECHLER took second in floor exercise and ninth in tumbling. Theresa Kuzinski rated eighth in both balance beam and trampoline.

Rhonda McLean placed third in vaulting. Sharon Overfield fourth in floor exercise, Linda Girolami was fifth in floor exercise and 10th on the balance beam.

Sandy Laatsch took fourth on uneven parallel bars and fifth in tumbling.

Duckel boys finished third as a team with Al Burchi tak-

ing second in tumbling, seventh in floor exercise and trampoline.

Bill Doerr was fifth in high bar, 10th in side horse. Brian Kelly was fifth in tumbling, sixth in trampoline. Steve Carl took sixth in side horse with Dave Crockett ranking seventh.
