

Meeting Planned On New Library

FARMINGTON

The board of trustees of the Farmington District Library will hold a public meeting concerning construction of the new library at 8 p.m. April 29 in the Farmington Community Center.

The library is to be constructed on 12 Mile Rd. across from O. E. Dunckel Junior High at 32800 12 Mile Rd.

The model of the new library and architect's drawings will be on display. In addition, the board has prepared a financial fact sheet detailing income and expenditures which will be distributed to the audience.

Mary Allison, secretary of the board of trustees, says the board members will discuss the entire expansion program and answer questions.

The new library, she says, is an attempt to provide standard library services which the present library can not.

"Our present facility is completely inadequate as to size, book collections and staff to meet our increasing population," she says.

Everyone interested in this development is invited to attend.

Wanted: History Photos

FARMINGTON He is on sabbatical leave this year but Farmington High School teacher Lee S. Peel is busy.

Peel is writing a history of Farmington township and city dating back to when the village of Farmington was incorporated in 1857.

HE HAS BEEN searching historic archives, interviewing the descendants of Farmington pioneers, digging through old records and newspapers, photographing over 300 antique pictures, taking pictures of his own and in between has completed typing of 41,000 words recounting the colorful history of city and township.

Peel estimates he has about 10,000 to 15,000 more words to write before his history is complete. He emphasizes that the writing of the book has no connection with Oakland County's sesqui-centennial celebration this year.

Publication date of the book is tentatively set for October 1971. Peel expects to complete the text and photographic layout this summer and will still have to write more than 400 captions for the pictures next year when he is back at Farmington High teaching his English classes and supervising production of the school newspaper.

These include:

A picture of the Warner farms buildings that used to stand where the post office is, the houses that used to be where Federal's Store now is, any photo of a Farmington person in an early automobile, any photo of a Farmington person in a cutter, a picture of the plank road going through town.

Another item Peel would like to find is a phone book dating back to the early 1920s.

A picture of the old stage curtain that used to hang in town hall, one of the old Stone School (Olman School) at 11 1/2 Mile and Middle Belt and one of the Greek Revival house that stood until it burned in 1969 at Farmington Rd. and the expressway north of town.

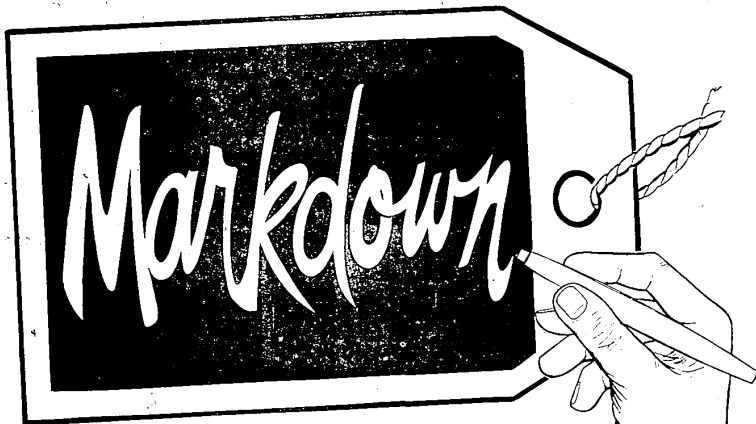
