Scholarships in memory of Farmington High School students, Rick Nash and Ken Williams, will be offered for the first time to 1970 graduates.

Rick Nash was killed in a cycle accident just before his 1969 graduation. Any boy or girl with the requisite good scholarship and citizenship is eligible to compete for the scholarship dedicated to his memory.

Application deadline for the \$200 award is May 1.

Amount of the scholarship in memory of Ken Williams, a 1967 graduate who died in Vietnam, has not yet been determined, but qualifications and deadline are the same. It is being presented by the FEA scholarship committee.

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Kendallwood Subs Get Resurfacing

All streets in Kendallwood Subdivisions 2 and 3 are scheduled to be resurfaced beginning April 27.

The Oakland County Road Commission says five miles of streets within the two subdivisions will be resurfaced and an additional three-tenths of a mile will be paved with concrete.

Capillac Asphalt Paving Co. of Southfield has been awarded the contract for the project at a cost of \$332,440. Property owners, Oakland County and Farmington Township are financing the project.

The resurfacing is scheduled to be finished Sept. 1. The only road to be closed is Kendallwood Rd. from 12 Mile Rd. to just north of Brandywine Rd.

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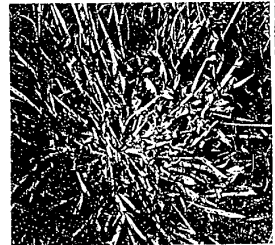
