Southfield rips N. Farmington

The victory, the Jays' 21st in 23 starts this season, means a trip to the Class A regional tomorrow night at Ferndale High School.

The loss means an end to a 10-12 sea-son for first-year coach Tom Negoshian and his North Farmington Raiders.

But the old sports saw about the game being closer than the final score indicated, certainly applied to this out-ing as far as Southfield coach Greg Sliwka was concerned.

"North Farmington came to play," said Silwka after the game. "North Farmington played their butts off, and it was good for our kids to see that. It was good for them to see what a 125 percent effort looks like." And Southfield shot hot, especially early in the game. Most Jay shots were falling early on. Even when they didn't, there was Michael McCaskill going high for the tip in.

McCaskill, a 6-foot-4 senior who could be headed for all-state status, finished with a team-high 20 points on a variety of tips, short jumpers and a couple of crowd-pleasing slam dunks.

Joey Walton, a 5-11 sharpshooting guard, sorred 18 points, and Ray Kelser had 16.

ACTUALLY, THE Jays owe their landslide to a very quick start. South-field clicked off the first mine points be-fore North's Ray Boyle finally hit a layup. Southfield had 25 points to North's 13 at quarter's end.

Southfield extended the margin to 17 pints (47-30), but the second half was played on more even terms, 40 points for the Jays, 34 for the Raiders.

The Jays shot 50 percent from the field, taking 74 shots, making 37. North had far fewer shots, 45, but made 23 of them for 51 percent.

"This is our home court and we do a lot of shooting here," said Sliwka when asked to comment on his team's excep-tional shooting.

"We do have four or live good shooters. You could mention Walton, Hart, Darden and Kelser. And I think McCaskill's a pretty good shooter, too. It's just that he's so involved in doing some many other things for us."

SOME OF THOSE other things: blocking shots (six against North Farmington), rebounding (eight) and dealing out assists (eight).

Darden and Hart combined for 11 re-bounds to help McCaskill on the boards, Southfield held a 34-15 rebounding ad-

"We just couldn't stay with South-field on the boards — the defensive boards," Negoshian said, "We don't have a whole lot of height, sot it's hard to compete with a team like that."

North's Boyle, a 6-2 senior guard who likes crashing down the lane and along the base line, scored 20 points on eight field goals and four of five free throws.

He showed the district fans he could score by notching 28 in North's win over city-rival Farmington last Tues-day.

Mike Black, Boyle's backcourt mate, added 12 points, and John Nowak came off the bench to fire in 19. North was sharp from the free throw line, making 18 of 20.
