It was clearly marked... no smoking area. They were sitting under the sign and smoking furfously. They were nurses from an area hospital, on their afternoon break.

I was sitting with a woman from the parish I serve as pastor. I had just visited her 7-year-old son, hospitalized with a severe digestive disorder. She was sharing some of her experiences with her son.

As an infant, he had been unable to keep food down and had baffled doctors for weeks. Finally, they had removed his stomach.

HIS ESOPHAGUS HAD to be stretched first every day and then eve-ry week. Finally, he was able to leave the hospital and go home.

The parents lovingly cared for their son. At hospital check-up time, the medical staff would express delight at his stamina and growth. The parents interpreted that to mean that the medical staff was surprised their son had survived.

Now, the boy's poor circulation has led to other problems. During a recent illness, his toes and part of his feet were cut off from a supply of blood.

The boy is now facing the loss of part of both.

THE MOTHER TOLD me how she and her husband had become more sensitive and grateful for the gitts of life they had once taken for granted. They had accepted the gift of responsibility for the care of their son.

Most never think about the workings of the body's digestive system. In the process, food goes down the esophagus



and the stomach pulls it through the process of nourishing the body. Their son's atomach reversed the process. He could keep nothing down.

Now that their son cannot walk because he is walting for foot and toe surgery, they have become acutely aware of how limited one's mobility is when dependent on either a wheelchair or a parent's lowing arm.

ance. Life has changed drastically for both parents and child. What was once commonplace has become meaningful. What others take for granted they regard with special appreciation. What others might treat casually they attend to with loving care.

In the midst of pain and anguish, life has unfolded its importance to them. It is a gift they cherish and affirm with love.

I was wrong in not reminding them of ilife's worth and care. The nurses were remiss in not remembering.

Shingles or Herpes Zoster is an acute infection caused by the varicellazorster virus. It is an itching and painful skin rash on the face or trunk and is most seen in older adults. The rash usually follows the underlying route of a cranial or spinal nerve, and appears as a series of tiny blisters that eventually break and form a crust.

The symptoms of the infection persist anywhere from two to five weeks. After healing the pain of the neuralgla may remain for months in some individuals.



Since shingles is slightly infectious, appropriate precautions must by taken. Medical help should be sought for this painful condition as complication can develop.


