the township's allocation budget which requests an allo-cated millage from Oakland County of 1.4 mills (\$1.40 per \$1,000 valuation).

Hall said he expects a state equalization factor of one for a total equalized valuation in the township of about \$236 million.

Once the County Board of Commissioners approves the equalization factor and the county allocation board decides the township's share, then the township can begin work on its final budget.

Hall said he hopes the town-ship can reduce its police and fire voted millage from 2 to 1.8 mills but this would require a county allocation of at least one mill.

He clarified that the \$15,000 cost to add a patrolman to the police force represented total

cost including benefits. Annual salary of .a policeman, Hall added, is now \$10,400.

The board instructed its attorney to prepare an ordinance to assess arm costs per residential unit for the 10 Mile Sewer Arm. It is estimated the per unit cost will be \$500 which can be paid over 10 years.
