The win lifted Seabold's overall record to 7-4-1.

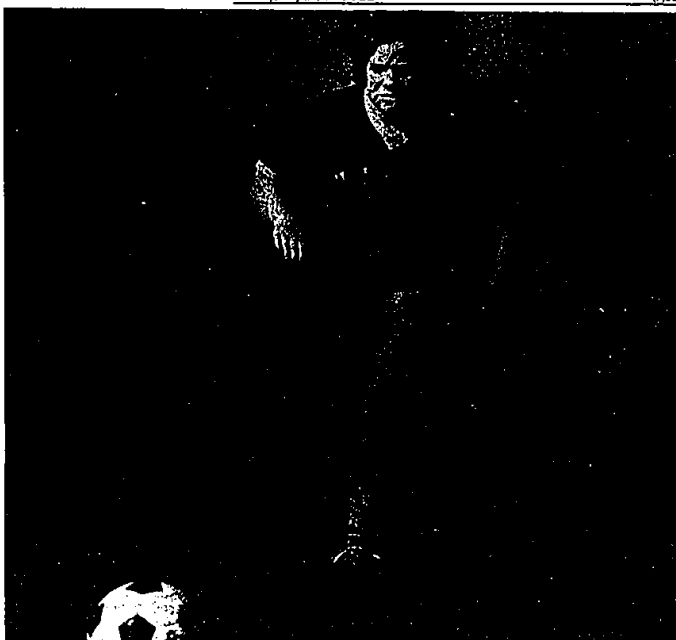
BIRMINGHAM MARIAN jumped all over University Liggett last Wednesday, clobbering the Knights, 5-1.

The Mayor proclaimed May 18 through 21, 1983 as Michigan Week, when the annual exchange of Mayors takes place.

The request by Controlled Precision Machinery, Inc. to establish an Industrial Development District pursuant to Act 198 of P.A. 1974, was adjourned until requested by proposal.

Request from the Farmington Hills Non-profit Housing Corporation that the City consider funding public improvements and providing money for senior citizen housing was referred to administration for recommendation.

Council approved Site Plan for Green Hill Apartments (Phase #4) and Easement Agreement for Parks #6 and #7 Green Hill Commons in the amount of \$7,325, subject to execution of Easement and Agreement for future sidewalks between School Board, Developer and City.

Application of Dr. David Dodge to Cable Television Access Committee was confirmed by Council.

Council agreed to hold an executive session immediately following the meeting to discuss pending litigation.

Council approved Resolution on proposed 1983/84 budget for May 31, 1983 at 7:30 P.M. and authorized advertisement of public notice of hearing on establishing 1983-84 tax rate.

Resolution was approved for submittal of grant application to State Land Trust Fund for purchase of Spices property.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON LEVYING ADDITIONAL PROPERTY TAXES AND ON THE PROPOSED FISCAL 83/84 CITY BUDGET.**

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills will hold a public hearing at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 31, 1983 in the Council Chambers at City Hall, 31555 West Eleven Mile Road, on the proposed 1983 city tax levy and on the proposed 1983/84 city budget. Copies of the proposed budget are available for public inspection during regular business hours in the office of the City Clerk, Farmington Hills Branch Library, 23737 West Twelve Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Michigan, and at the Farmington Branch Library, 23550 Liberty, Farmington, Michigan. All interested citizens are encouraged to attend and submit written or oral comments.

Last year (1982) the City levied 7.4360 mills (\$7.4360 per \$1000 SEV) for City operations and .3895 mills (\$.3895 per \$1000 SEV) for City debt service. This combined operation and debt service levy of 7.8255 was a reduction from the previous year's millage of 8.50 mills. State Law Act 5 of 1982 provides that Notice of Public Hearing be given when additional millage rates are proposed.

Due to a decrease in State Equalized Values of existing property in the City in 1983 which thereby reduced the amount of revenue produced by the 1982 millage rate, plus increased operating and service costs, and the City's commitments to drainage, local street and other public facility improvements, the City will be required to raise additional revenues by increasing tax millage.

For these and other reasons, in order to fund the City's proposed 1983/84 budget and to maintain essential services, meet debt obligations, provide capital improvements, the City finds it necessary to levy additional mills of up to 1.2506 (\$1.2506 per \$1000 SEV) above the 1982 base operating millage rate and levy debt millage of .4064 mills (\$.4064 per \$1000 SEV). This additional millage is to be allocated .2506 mills for operations and 1.0 mills for capital improvements. This millage rate will provide an estimated increase of 3.4% in property tax revenues for operating purposes and 13.4% for capital improvements; for a total increase of 16.8% in property tax revenues. The City has complete authority to establish the number of mills proposed to be levied from within its authorized millage rate.
