

North girls win 1st ever league track crown

Two new engravings will appear on the Northwest Suburban League (NSL) track trophy.

Garden City, which consolidated East and West high schools last fall, captured the boys' title. North Farmington, meanwhile, reigns as girls' champion, the first title in the school's history.

"I feel fantastic," said GC coach Clayton Kelly, who came up empty-handed in four years at East. "I figured we'd win, but I knew it would be tight. I was confident, though."

Depth was the story as the Cougars rolled up 131 points. Westland John Glenn was second with 111 followed by North Farmington, third, 101; Redford Union, fourth, 82; Livonia Franklin, fifth, 60; and Redford Thurston, sixth, 28.

Fittingly, Garden City won the final event, the 1,600-meter relay, as Phil Kanum, Pat Mulcahy, Paul Sheffer and Chris Biegalski were clocked in 3:29.2.

GARDEN CITY'S two individual winners were state qualifier Jeff Fells in the high jump (6-4), who edged RU's Brian Gustafson on fewer misses, and Kimm in the 600 run (2:00.5).

But the big surprise was senior Craig Dimaya, who placed second in the long jump (19-11), third in the high jump (6-0) and fifth in the 110 hurdles (16.3).

"We just tossed Dimaya in the long jump and he gets a second," said Kelly. "And we didn't plan on doubling Dave Homann, who is only a sophomore, and he gets a second in the 3,200 and fourth in the 1,600. We also got a shot in the arm when Biegalski took fifth in the 400."

Mulcahy grabbed a pair of seconds to also help win the meet for the Cougars. Glenn's Tom Evanoff and North's Chris Walker were both double winners.

Evanoff swept the 200 and 400 dashes with times of 23.3 and 51.3, respectively. Walker, meanwhile, ruled the 1,600 and 3,200 runs with clockings of 3:15 and 9:59.7.

Other noteworthy first-place performances were turned in by Bob Johnson of Redford Union in the pole vault, 13-

6; John Enright, Thurston, 300 hurdles, 39.8; Tom Lucas, Franklin, 100 dash, 11.1; and Eric Collier, North, long jump, 20-1.

NORTH'S GIRLS needed a fourth place in the final event, the 1,600 relay, to hold off Redford Union.

The Raider girls did better than that as anchor Kim Mandel held off RU's hard-charging Angie Mogielski in a photo finish at the wire.

North scored 105 points to RU's 97. Rounding out the field were: Franklin, third place, 85; John Glenn, fourth, 71; Garden City, fifth, 66; and Thurston, sixth, 34.

"We were certainly concerned about RU's depth in the distance events," said North fifth-year coach Ralph Temby. "And we knew Franklin had a lot of speed, but with John Glenn and Garden City cutting into the scoring — that helped."

North also won the 800 relay and received individual firsts from Sharon Shifra, long jump, 15-6 1/2; Marcia Thompson, high jump, 5-3; Sue Hedfield, 100 hurdles, 15.2; and 300 hurdles, 49.8.

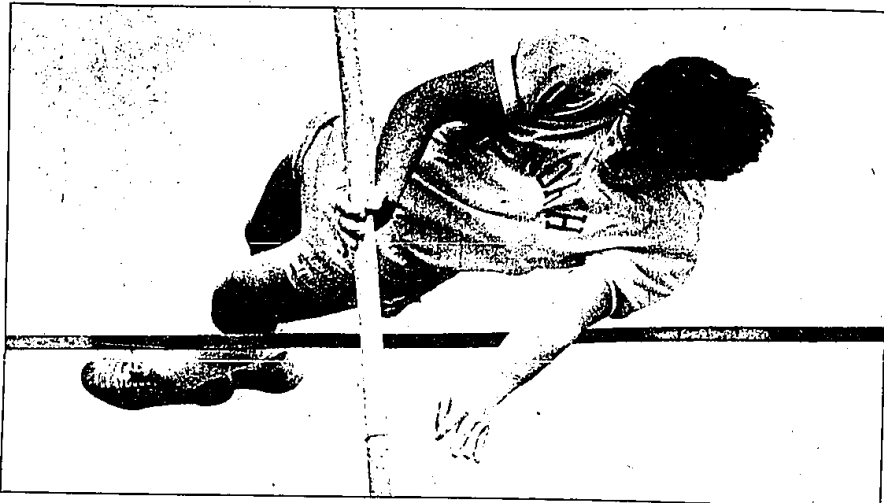
"In the field events we scored 46 points and were able to build a big cushion," Temby said. "We were fortunate that we built that big lead because we knew we couldn't couldn't score in the middle distances with Sara Cline out with bronchitis."

MOGIELSKI, BY FAR, was the meet's most impressive performer. The RU standout won the 800 run in 2:07.7 to break the NSL meet record. She also tied the her own league mark in the 1,600 with a time of 5:19.6, winning easily.

RU also got a strong showing from Chris Vedder, who won the discus (106-5) and shot put (35-4).

Franklin's Sue Johnson, a junior, also won two events. She captured first in the 400 dash (1:03.7) and 100 dash (13.1). Johnson also took fourth in the 200, which was won by Garden City's Sue Tankersley.

The most exciting race of the day was the girls' 3,200 run. Laura Graulis, a lanky sophomore from Glenn, led all the way until she was nipped at the finish line by RU's Cathy Koski.

Raider boys grab another NSL tennis title

It was really no surprise.

North Farmington captured its fifth straight Northwest Suburban League tennis championship Thursday at Westland John Glenn. But this time around, the Raiders added a new wrinkle — they were unbeaten in the competition.

North Farmington netted raked up 19 points to cruise into first place and the league title. Nearest competitor was John Glenn with 8 points. Garden City was third with 6, Redford Thurston was fourth with 4 and Livonia Franklin was fifth with a pair of points. Raider Jim Gaskill nailed down the

number one singles title with 6-2, 7-6 victories over Paul Gratzl of Glenn.

Tom Ferrer was number two singles champ with 6-4, 6-3 wins over John Hinkley of Garden City. Chuck Homolka won the third spot, defeating Mike Burrell of John Glenn, 6-4, 7-5. Rob Singer was number four singles titleholder, beating Dean Hooley of Glenn, 1-6, 6-2, 6-4.

North Farmington's team of Russ Ikonen and Bob Ferrer defeated Randy Lotero and Mike Berres of Franklin, 6-4, 6-2, for the top doubles berth.

Brian Welsman and Chris Senkowski scored a pair of 7-5 wins over Jeff Zigmans and Mark Maguran of Garden City for the number two doubles title. Pete May and Kit Tomkow beat Kevin Sobas and Brian Gwizdz of Garden City, 6-1, 6-4, for the third doubles championship.

Veteran Raider coach Norman Stan-

iszewski said, "I knew we could do it if we played up to our potential."

The Raiders ended the season with a 13-1 overall record, undefeated in eight league contests. The squad finished fourth at regionals. "It was one of the best seasons we ever had," Staniszewski said.
