Singers Sought By Aspen Choral

Bradley R. Bloom, director of choirs at Schoolcraft College, has been named assistant director of the Aspen Choral Institute for its summer workshop July 12 through Aug. 23 in conjunction with the Aspen Music School and Festival at Aspen, Colo.

John Nelson, of the Juilliard School, is director of the institute, and the faculty includes such distinguished choral authorities as Robert Shaw, founder of the famous chorale; Howard S. Swan, of Occidental College; and Robert Fountain, professor of choral conducting at Oberlin College Conservatory of Music.

BLOOM SAID two choral ensembles will perform during the period of the institute. One of these, the Aspen Chamber Choir, will be a group of 24 selected singers who will receive stipends for their services during the summer.

These singers will be selected by nation-wide auditions, two of which Bloom will conduct early in May on the following schedule:

Saturday, May 9, in the main lobby, University of Michigan School of Music, North Campus, Ann Arbor, from 12 to 4 p.m.

Sunday, May 10, Westminster Church, 17567 Hubbell at Outer Drive, Detroit, from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m.

SINGERS PLANNING to audition should prepare two arias, one in a foreign language. Bloom said sightreading and flexibility will be of most importance. Solo experience is not required, and emphasis will be placed on good choral background.

Bloom was a participant in the institute last summer and was named by Nelson to return this year as assistant director. A graduate of the University of Michigan, he served there as assistant director of choirs.

He is presently musical director of the U. of M. Gilbert and Sullivan Society, is conductor of the U. of M. Theater Orchestra, and has served on the faculties of Eastern Michigan University and the National Music Camp at Interlochen.
