Local Men Kuhn Hails **Spending Cuts** Help Plan By State Satellite

State Sen. George W. Kuhn (R-Biomfield), is pleased with G.O.P. senators and Governor William Milliken who agreed to sharp cutbacks in the gover-nor's budgel.
