Barnard's interest in Reuther stemmed from the development of a history course on the American labor

movement.
"One thing sort of led to another. As I developed material for this course, I found myself collecting material on Reuther," explained the Bioomfield Hills resident.

Sr. Fulgenzi completed her dissertation, research and clinical experience in parenting skills for her PhD from the University of Windoor, A faculty member at St. John's, she is a licensed psychologist for the State of Michigan and on the staff of the Human Growth Center, Inc., Ann Arbor. In July, Sr. Fulgenzi will assume a new position as delegate for religious studies for the Saginaw Diocese, while remaining as an adjunct faculty at St. John's.

Marina Herrera, PhD, a specialist in cross-cultural communication and religious education, will teach the second course, ministry to Hispanies in North America. Canon law on marriage will be pre-sented by Daniel J. Ward, an assistant professor in theology and government at St. John's University, Collegeville, Minn. Both a canon lawyer and a civil lawyer, P. ALTHOUGH BARNARD beyor met Reuther, who died in 1970, he had little difficulty finding materials difficulty finding materials to the research came from Wayne State the research came from Wayne State, the official depository for UAW records.

"There were millions of papers on Reuther," said Barnard. "My problem in writing this book was in selection, and in trying to zero in on the things Reuther did and why he did them."

According to Barnard, Routher was able to take advantage of the depression, which played a big part in organizing the UAW in 1933.

Barnard's detailed blography also shows Reuther, who, incidentally, lived in Oakland Township, as a private person, who was not a "backapper."

"He doesn't fit that stereotype of labor leaders or politicians. He just wasn't that way," the author said.

"Reuther was a controversial figure;

He didn't pay himself a high salary and he didn't die a wealthy make he most important Barnard believes the most important hing about Reuther was "he never saw thing about Reuther was "he never saw the union as just a way of improving the sainafard of living for members, but the sainafard of living for members, but the sainafard of living for members, but as an instrument to achieve public purpose."

Barnard assigned his book to a histo-

ry class last semester, but found using his own work for a text made little difference except to lend confidence. However, he did have to drop his lectures on Retuber and the UAW because it is all in the book.
"Now I have to go out and find other things to talk about."

The OU professor has no figures yet on the possible profit from his book, although be has seen hard cover copies on shelves in local book stores. The edition came out in December and sales reports are made only every six months.

"It did take care of all my Christmasgiving, though," he admitted with arrsmile.

Barnard, who has published other work, enjoys writing although "if's not an easy thing to do, particularly."

And he plans to do more work in the area of labor unions. "if's a complex area. What's going to happen in the future is up in the air, and the role of unions and industry is uncertain," he said.


