Fingerprinting is newest move to protect kids

The children's fingerprinting pro-gram offered in May by Farmington Police turned out to be a pretty good idea, according to law enforcement of-

idea, according to law enforcement officials.

Farmington Police are again offering the free fingerprinting for children
under 18 years of age from 10 a.m. to 5
p.m. on Saturdays, June 18 and 25, in
the Farmington City Hall lobby.

During the first two fingerprinting
sessions in May, approximately 300
children, with accompanying parents,
turned out to have their prints taken,
said Farmington Public Safety Depuiy
Director Frank Lauboff.

"We've been printing people since,"
Lauhoff said. People who missed the
towo earlier sessions have stopped in the
lobby asking to have their children's
prints taken.

"So far, the program has been a sucsas," said Officer Vince Ziegler, who
runs the fingerprinting program in
Farmington.

Ziegler said that at first he was unsure how parents would react to having their children's prints taken. Ziegler said, most parents have asked why such a program wasn't developed years ago.

"I try to make it as pleasant as possi-ble for the children," Ziegler said.

THE MISSING Children Act of 1982, in part, along with growing publicity on missing children, prompted the child identification program. Lauboff said. The new act is designed to assist state, federal and local officials in locating missing children and for all agencies to share information about missing children.

Although dental X-rays are the most accurate method of permanent identification for both children and adults, there is no way to identify a child who has not visited the dentist.

"If you have a child under 4, the only identification is the footprint from the hospital which is usually inaccurate," Lauhoff said. "The dentist is the first chance of permanent record. Up until then there is virtually no way to identify them."

Parents who are required to accompany their children to the fingerprinting program must sign a walver form

which makes them responsible for any future use of the prints.

A child's fingerpfints will be given to the parents and not kept on file at the police department for current or future use, Lauboff said.

Parents will be given their child's fingerprints along with a "child identification" envelope which parents can use to store their child's most recent photograph, fingerprints, identification card detailing physical marks and characteristics, and names and phone numbers of doctors and dentists.

Younger children, Ziegler said, should have their photographs updated every six months. Their paimprints also will be included on the fingerprint card given to parents, he said, because sometimes it is difficult to clearly print each finger on a young child's hand.

When a child or adult is missing, Lauboff said, relatives should call police immediately, Although most people believe they should wait for 24 hours before filing a missing persons report, the police should be called immediately, particularly with children.
