COPING WITH THE PAIN OF ARTHRITIS

One of the most discouraging aspects of arthritis is its constant pain. The question arises why physicians don't make use of effective painkillers such as codeine.

One reason is because patients with arthritis usually require months to years of treatment. The longer that codeine is used the more of it that is needed to relieve pain. In time, usual medical amounts will be insufficient. Another unwanted side effect is profound constipation. An additional drug or dietary regimen will counter this effect, only stopping the codeine will do. Finally for older persons, the use of codeine and similar drugs is dangerous: dizziness and loss of equilibrium may result exposing the individual to the risk of sudden and serious falls.

Physicians who care for arthritic patients depend on seemingly mild pain relieving drugs. Such a choice is appropriate as stronger medications well may cause the user more harm than help.
