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Bank Card Credit Use To Expand

Credit cards from national oil companies and major retailers have provided for many years the convenience of getting payment and freedom from carrying large sums of cash.

Added to them in recent years are travel and entertainment credit cards. The credit-card way of life seems to be accepted. Almost 500 million credit cards are currently in circulation in the United States, according to Helen E. Bell, extension home management specialist at Pennsylvania State University.

A NEW USE for credit cards includes the extension of credit. Many large city banks are now offering multi-purchase credit cards. The bank-card plan entitles the holder to make purchases in several stores and to pay for them with one payment to the bank. To effect, the bank extends credit to the customer by assuring member stores in the bank's plan that the buyer will pay for his purchases.

Electronic devices have simplified bookkeeping details to the extent that many kinds of payments can be included in the one-bank card plan, Miss Bell explains.
