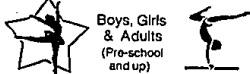

The German sauerkraut, knackwurst, potato salad and potato pancakes that is served sidewalk-cafe style each summer on the grounds of the church have become a festival tradition.

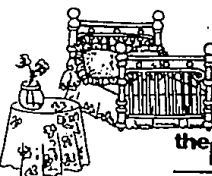
This year two additions are added.

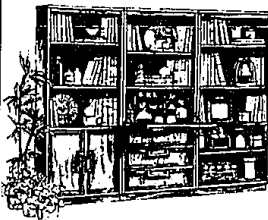
