Dr. Jerome V. Cullio of West Bloomfield recently was named assistant professor of orthopaedic surgery at Wayne State University School of Medicine and Chief of Orthopaedic Surgery at Veterans Administration Hospital in Allen Park.

One of the team physicians for the United States Football League champion Michigan Panthers, he will establish a sports medicine clinic in the Detroit Medical Center. He holds affiliations with Harper-Grace, Detroit Receiving and Children's hospitals and the Rehabilitation Institute.

A native of Detroit, Cullio received his bachelor of arts and medical degrees from the University of Michigan.

He completed a flexible internship and a residency in orthopaedic surgery at Henry Ford Hospital, where he helped develop the orthopaedic research lab.

Cullio has received awards for his scientific papers on swimmer's shoulder and shoulder impingement. He has made presentations on orthopaedics and sports medicine throughout the country.

In addition to his duties as team physician for the Michigan Panthers, he has been assistant team physician for the Boston Bruins hockey team and the New England Patriots football team. Over the years, he has been team physician for Long Beach State University,

and worked with the Detroit rugby team and the Detroit Stormers professional karate team.

Cullio holds brown belts in karate and judo.


