Bequest Shown At Art Institute

DETROIT The Tannahill Bequest, the latest single gift ever received by the Detroit Institute of Arts, goes on display this week. The exhibit will run through Aug. 16 at the institute.

Collected by the late Robert Hudson Tannahill, the bequest includes 400 works of impressionist and post-impressionist paintings, sculpture, drawings and prints, pre-Columbian and African artifacts and unusual French silver.

THURSDAY, MAY 21, Dr. Frederick Cummings, assistant director of the institute, will base his talk on the Tannahill collection in the final Scholar's Choice lecture at 2 p.m. Admission is \$2.50 at the door of the institute's lecture hall.

Throughout the exhibition period, hour-long tours will be conducted by members of the Founders Society Decent Committee at 1 p.m., Tuesdays through Fridays, and on Sundays at 12 noon and 1:30 p.m. There is no charge and tours will meet at the exhibition entrance.

"Impressionism and After" is the title of a four-lecture series offered Tuesdays, at 8 p.m., in the museum lecture hall. Claude Marks will talk on "Impressionism and the Rediscovery of Nature: Manet to Cezanne," May 19; "The Drama of Expressionism: 'Emotion and Distortion,'" May 26; and "From Picasso to Pop: 20th Century Art Forms in Paris and New York," June 2.

A Tuesday afternoon lectures series beginning June 16,

from 1:30 to 3 p.m., will center on six masterpieces by Degas, Cezanne, Picasso, Rouault and Marin, from the collection. Registration for this series begins June 1 at University Center for Adult Education, 577-4670. Fee for the six-week series is \$15.

Art Auction Aids Power Center Fund

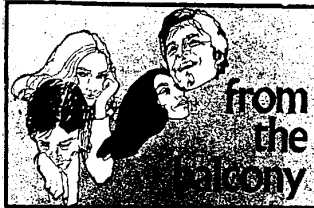
An estimated 100 works of art will be auctioned May 23 to benefit the Power Center for the Performing Arts at the University of Michigan.
