## Livonia BPW Set Up Schoolcraft Loan Fund

The Livonia Business & Professional Women's organization has established a loan fund at Schoolcraft College. The fund will be used to help pay tuition costs for a needy young woman of the area with the understanding that the loan be repaid when possible.

Announcement of the new loan was made during the May 12 dinner meeting of the Livonia BPW.

The fund will be a permanent revolving fund in the name of the Livonia BPW and will be added to and increased in the future.

Edward V. McNally, vice president for student affairs at Schoolcraft, re-

ceived the initial check for the fund from outgoing club President Eleanor Senkowski.

Mrs. Senkowski announced that the club will make contributions to the Livonia chapter of the American Field Service, Livonia Youth Inc. and the cancer fund of the BPW.

Officers for the coming year were also installed at the meeting. They are: Patricia Krolkowski, president; Rosina Raymond, president-elect; Jane Hopper, first vice president; Grace Hay, recording secretary; Ruth Ventura, corresponding secretary; and Nellie Reynolds, treasurer.

## 'Questers' Meet In Plymouth

Several hundred "Questers" will bring their enthusiasm for America's past to Plymouth's Mayflower Hotel, Wednesday, May 20.

About 300 are expected to attend the Heritage Day luncheon meeting in the hotel, located at the corner of Main St. and Ann Arbor Trail. They are members of Michigan Questers, a state federation allied with the National Antiquities and Historic Preservation Society.

The program will open with coffee and registration at 9 a.m.

The luncheon is an annual event during Michigan week, although a different locale is chosen each year.

Miss Florence E. Wright will describe decorative stenciling of the American Empire period, about 1810 to 1830. Her afternoon talk will be illustrated with slides. She will demonstrate stencil techniques and will exhibit examples of these "fancy furnishings" of the Hitchcock era.

Miss Wright, a former professor of home economics at Cornell University, now makes her home in South Lyon, and teaches stenciling.

DURING the morning, delegates will inspect antiques from the collections of members of the 10 local chapters in this area. These chapters are also hosting the event.

The program will open with a style parade of Quester models wearing beifroom costumes.

After Miss Wright's talk, the delegates will tour the Plymouth Historical Museum.

Delegates will be welcomed by Mrs. Roderick Cassidy, a descendant of one of Plymouth's pioneer families. Mrs. Cassidy, who is a charter

member of the Plymouth Historical Society, will give a short talk on the town's early history. Her grandfather, Samuel Baker, joined the westward trek from New York and settled in Plymouth in 1837.

MRS. CHARLES O. WALKER JR., of Detroit, outgoing president of Michigan Questers, will preside. Mrs. Preston Meisel of Farmington, the general chairman, will be assisted by Mrs. E.W. Brandt of Redford Township.

Delegates are expected from most of the 70 Quester chap-

ters in the state, representing about 1,000 members.

The 10 local chapters, whose members are responsible for the event, take their names from historical landmarks in their areas.

They are: Baseline, which includes Northville; Bell, Madam Cadillac; and Sand Hill, Redford Township; Quakertown and Mill Creek, from Farmington; deTette, which includes northwest Detroit and Livonia; Mead's Mill, Northville; Silver Springs, Plymouth and Northville; and Pontchartrain, Detroit.

Her flowers were white roses and carnations with Stephanotis and baby's breath.

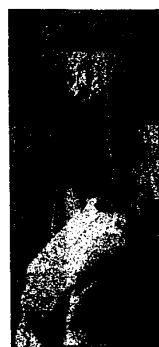

The bridegroom is the son of William L. Todd of Holden, Mass., and the late Mrs. Todd.

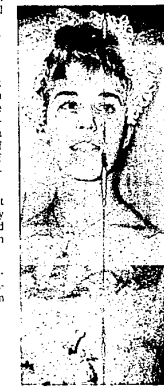
