A Farmington doctor, who
also happens to own a nursing
home, foresees that a retirement village will be located in
Farmington within the next
five years.
Dr. Edwin Blumberg described a retirement village
Tuesday to 40 senior citizens
at the Farmington Community
Center.

As Blumberg explains it, a retirement village is several facilities located on a plut of 50 acres or more providing integrated and combined care satisfying all needs of a large group of elderly residents.

THE PROJECT WOULD, include provision for extended care, skilled care and basic care, as well as apartments or condominiums, all located on landscaped grounds with a fringe of limited commercial establishments.

COWAN TESTIFIED before the Oakland County Drug Commission this year, and his research findings are included in Gov. William Milliken's Drug Committee Report. In 1969 he met with parents of drug users in group counseling.

He is a member of the American Personnel and Guid-ance Association, the Ameri-can Rehabilitation Counselors Association and the Michigan Personnel and Guidance Asso-ciation.

Cowan also has written several articles, one of them on "high school potheads" and another on "a program for vocationally limited youth."
