Baby likes familiar things, so keep his schedule as normal as possible: bring along favorite toys...especially cuddly ones to sleep with...and foods that he likes best. If his feeding schedule is kept routine, travel will be more of a breeze. He may eat less than usual, but don't urge food on him that he doesn't want.
