

Law Seeks End To Disorder

The Farmington Township Board, meeting Monday night after two student demonstrations within a week in Farmington Township, considered an addition to the township ordinance to broaden the disorderly person ordinance.

Passage of an addition to the ordinance was tabled until the next regular meeting. The proposed addition would make it a misdemeanor to be engaged in making noise, disturbance, trouble, improper diversion, or a riot.

TOWNSHIP ATTORNEY Joseph T. Brennan introduced the proposal, saying it had been requested by the township's police department. The police, he said, felt they had "no real need tool" to quiet disturbances.

Trustee Margaret Schaeffer began the tabling process by questioning the need of adding to the existing disorderly person ordinance.

"It seems quite broad," commented Mrs. Schaeffer, an attorney.

Trustee Earl Oppertauer also objected to the ordinance, saying some of the wording was vague.

"THE WORDS 'trouble' or 'improper diversion' were pointed out as vague by Oppertauer.

Brennan said the ordinance was a common one in surrounding municipalities. He said the ordinance was broad, then commented, "It is an area that can cause some problem, if it's not handled carefully."

The township attorney commented the police force is professional enough to use the ordinance correctly.

Mrs. Elise Avery, township treasurer, commented on the recent demonstration by students on the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Commercial College. She said the march and assembly "could have been improper disturbance," which would be covered under the proposal.

IN OTHER business, the trustees accepted the resignation of William E. Dunn as secretary of the Zoning Board of Appeals. Township Supervisor Curtis Hall said Dunn had served in the position since 1957.

"I don't think we'll get anybody better. He certainly has been a pillar of strength," Hall said.

The trustees voted to begin legal action to remove two dilapidated houses on Orchard Lake Rd. The houses are at 2805 and 2857 Orchard Lake Rd. Hall said the owners of the houses had promised to remove them but failed to follow through.
