FOR THE MOST PART the Hall has welcomed men and women for their performances on the field of combat...which is why Schmidt and Rogell are

Schmidt distinguished himself for many years schmidt distinguished himself for many years as a defensive stalwart on the Lions. Rogell was one of the greats — the shortstop — on those wondrous Tiger teams which included Hank Greenberg, Charlie Gehringer and Marvin Owen in the infield. Only Owen of the quartet hasn't made it into the Hall.

As you peered at Forsythe's picture, memories kept flooding back. You knew him so well during most of his reign as the state director.

You'd quote him in the old Times more often than anybody else. And Charlie never complained. He never once countered: "Where'd you get those quotes."
