

## Artists and craftsman join for show

The 11th annual Arts and Crafts Show presented by Farmington Community Center is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 15, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. More than 50 artists and craftsmen will display and sell their original works throughout the center at 24705 Farmington Road.

The array of creative efforts, crafted in a variety of media, include pottery, jewelry, stained glass, baskets, wood carvings, dolls, soft sculpture, folk art, pen and ink sketches, watercolors, and dried flower arrangements. Many items for holiday giving, such as Christmas ornaments, are reasonably priced.

Needlework crafts such as quilts, lace and fabric ornaments, cross stitchery, and calico will also be exhibited.

The Arts and Crafts Show draws from throughout the metropolitan area, as well as out-of-state.

"The number of artists' requests to participate in this annual event far outnumber the display spaces available," said Betty Paine, executive director for the center. The show presents a well-rounded display of arts and handicrafts that are popular today, as well as folk art of the past.

There will be a light lunch and baked goods will also be on sale.

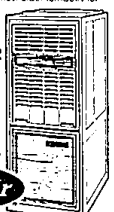

## Troop 45 has a new Eagle Scout

The highlight of Troop 45's Court of Honor this month was the ceremony in which Greg Laidlow took his Eagle Scout Award.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Laidlow, a senior at Harrison High School, He has been scouting for nine of his 18 years.

As a scout he completed the mile swim and hike, and was inducted into the Order of the Arrow where he became a brotherhood member and was in the Leadership Corps.

In school, he has been on the swim team for three years and earned a varsity letter in that sport while simultaneously earning a 3.4 grade point average.

He said he will be more active in school this year now that his Eagle project has been completed, with the track and swim team and working on the committees for the homecoming game and the prom. His classes will be preparing him for study in computer and economics when he attends Oakland University this fall.

He expects to remain a member of Troop 45, sponsored by First United Methodist Church of Farmington, serving now as an assistant scoutmaster.

IT WAS TROOP 45's current assistant scoutmaster who suggested Laidlow's Eagle service project, a community service that is required to attain the rank.

Laidlow completed two of the stations on the fitness trail that circle the Orchard Ridge Campus, Oakland Community College.

Of the 20 stations marked out along the trail, the maintenance crew has completed 10 of them at the rate of between two and four a year.

"By setting up two more stations, we saved the college about \$200 and helped speed up the completion of the entire trail," Laidlow said.

The "we" he speaks of is the crew he recruited from his troop which included his brother Scott.

## 'I Can Cope' class starts

A patient education program designed to help people seek strengths and resources to cope with the chronic disease cancer and its therapies is being offered at Sinai Hospital of Detroit, through the efforts of American Cancer Society volunteers.

The "I Can Cope" program series which was developed at North Memorial Medical Center, Minn., will begin at 7 p.m. eight consecutive Wednesdays, beginning Wednesday, Oct. 5, in the board room of Sinai Hospital, 6767 W. Outer Drive, Detroit. Upjohn Healthcare Services is providing additional funding assistance to the "I Can Cope" programs in various locations in the tri-county area.

The objectives of the patient education classes are three-fold: to increase the cancer patient's knowledge of the disease, to increase the cancer patient's control over his or her life and to decrease the anxiety the cancer patient feels about the disease.

The program will be led by Anne Peurasaari, medical and psychiatric

social worker; Will Levin, head nurse, oncology, at Sinai Hospital and Josephine Wharf, patient education at Upjohn Healthcare Services.

THE WEEKLY class sessions help participants increase their knowledge about physical anatomy, cancer, potential health problems that may arise, nutrition, communication skills, stress awareness, physical fitness, utilizing community resources, and the essential role patients play in their own treatment.

Guest instructors include a medical oncologist, clinical dietitian, oncology social worker, occupational therapist and pharmacist.

Cancer patients and family members can register for the "I Can Cope" course by calling the American Cancer Society 557-5353. There is no fee but class size is limited and participants are expected to attend every class session. Persons interested in courses held at other tri-county locations may inquire at the American Cancer Society by calling 557-5353.
