U.S. Senate Candidates Answer '2 Children' Questions

An Observer news roundup

Population control is a national issue that U.S. senators and representatives will have to face after the November elections this year.
Observer Newspapers decided to put the three candidates for senator from Michigan on the spot early. Exclusive interviews were obtained with:
U.S. Sen. Philip Hart. Democrat. two-term incumbent who is expected to seek re-election.
Mrs. Lenore Romney, Republican leadership consensus choice to challenge Hart. She is the wife of former Gov. George Romney, who is now President former Gov. George Romney, who is now President Nixon's secretary of Housing and Urban Develop-

State Sen. Robert Huber, conservative Republican from Troy who seeks to beat both Mrs. Romney in a primary and Sen. Hart in the general election to jump to Washington, after two terms in Lansing.

EACH WAS ASKED questions zeroing in on lour specific points raised by advocates of population control as the primary means of stemming environmental genocide.

As background, the candidates were reminded that the state's director of the Department of Natural Resources, Dr. Ralph McMullen, believes population control is paramount in the ecology struggle. His department has gone on record supporting birth control, the concept of two children per family and liberalized abortion laws. alized abortion laws.

Dr. McMullen told an audience during an Environmental Teach-In at Ann Arbor in March: "I suspect success (in balancing the environment) lies in

ONLY SEN. HUBER has been put to the test on this issue. When a proposed abortion reform bill came up for a vote in the Senate, he struck a blow against the idea by voting 'no."

SEN. HUBER --"The question of what I would do if I were just getting married is a non sequitor (unreasonable to answer).

SEN. HART --"I find it difficult to answer what

I would do if I were back at the beginning of married life, because I love eight children. At the same time, the reasons for the current alarm were not as evident (when I first married).

"Now nature has put us on warning that we must, at least for the immediate future, restrict the must, at least for the immediate future, restrict the number of children we have. Some scientists suggest two children per family. I haven't any particular quarrel with that, beyond noting that if every family limits itself to two, the national average that will live and grow will be below that."

QUESTION - Would you advocate that your teenage or older children sign a pledge not to have more than two children of their own?

MRS. ROMNEY - "No." SEN. HUBER - "Signing of pledges and other such activity is an artificial gesture that does not get to the root of the matter of population control: the decision of parenthood is a personal one, and no amount of public chest beating will change that." SEN. HART - "Not sign a pledge: but set such a

QUESTION - Do you believe limiting population should be a matter of national policy? If so, how should it be done? Do you believe there should be sanctions, such as denying income tax exemptions for more than two children?

MRS. ROMNEY - "Not policy. It can be done through education. President Nixon's program is perfectly in order: he's telling what the situation is and using the prestige of his office to create concern. I don't believe there should be sanctions. The people should just face the facts and know what will happen to our planet."

Pursell, Kadish Blast Kuhn's Abortion Vote

Both candidates seeking to unseat State Sen. George Kuhn (R-14th District) criticized Kuhn's final vote on liberalized abortion and said they would have helped pass the propos-als

als.

Carl Pursell of Plymouth, who is challenging Kuhn in the Republican party primary, said. "I would support any reasonable abortion law which reasonable abortion law which would allow a mother to have appropriate treatment, within the first 90 days, with the consent of her family physician and hopefully, the father, if he still is a member of the familie."

Paul Kadish of Livonia, who is seeking the Democratic party nomination for Kuha's Senate seat, said. Twoulded intely have voted for it. I feel very strongly about it. I wouldn't have gone for complete repeal of present abortion laws but would have supported either of the two liberalizing proposals."

KUHN SWITCHED sides on

Earlier in the week, he had supported the bill, which was defeated. On Friday, however, he voted against a motion to reconsider, in effect opposing the bill.

His switch was one of two key votes that helped bury the abortion bill.

Sen. Robert Huber of Troy, with whom Kuhn has been strongly allied, was absent for the Tuesday vote and voted "no" Friday.

Kuhn, whose district includes Livonia, Farmington and Plymouth, said a poll taken in his district showed a majority were opposed to changing the law. He said incomplete results showed 29% favoring the bills, 36% opposed and 35% unsure.

Take Boys Kuhn Crime Bill Passes Senate

LANSING
A bill (S.B. 1207), sponsored
by State Sen, George W. Kuhn
(R-West Bloomfield), to fight
organized crime connections in
controlling legitimate business,
passed the Senate by a vote of
30-4.

"This new concept of tighting organized crime through civil actions to close businesses infiltrated by criminal elements is similar to legislation passed by Florida last year," said Sen. Kuhn.

"Under this bill, the attorney general is authorized to begin civil proceedings to forfeit the charter of any domestic or foreign corporation whose officers or directors are engaged in criminal activities that might include a persistent course of violent revolutionary or unlawful activity aimed at the overthow of the government of the state or any of its political subdivisions, crimes against nature, intimidation and corection, bribery, prostitution, gambling, extortion, embezplement, unlawful sale of narcottes or other such illegal conduct."

KUHN SAID, "It is widely known that organized crime and vice are increasing in af-fluence and power, and such power naturally flows from the investment of vast sums of wealth procured illegally.
