

Cardinal Will Visit St. Aidan

John Cardinal Dearden, Archbishop of Detroit, will celebrate mass at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 23 in St. Aidan Catholic Church, 17500 Farmington Road, Livonia.

His visit here is in celebration of the golden jubilee of Pope Paul VI's ordination as a priest.

He is coming to St. Aidan, said the Rev. J. Edward Seifen, pastor, because the Livonia parish was the first in the Detroit archdiocese to be established after the Holy Father was elevated to his present office.

Pope Paul, ordained 50 years ago, was elevated in 1963, the same year St. Aidan came into being.

The Cardinal is returning this week from two weeks of meetings in Rome, so the topic of his sermon was not announced in advance.

The archdiocese office said it probably would concern the Holy Father and his relationship to people in the Archdiocese and especially the St. Aidan parish.

All parishes in the archdiocese have been asked to make some special notice of the pope's golden jubilee.

Cardinal Dearden was ordained in 1932 and appointed titular bishop of Serepta and co-adjutor bishop of Pittsburgh in March of 1948. He succeeded to the see of Pittsburgh Dec. 22, 1950, and was named assistant to the pontifical throne Oct. 15, 1957.

Promoted to the see of Detroit Dec. 18, 1958, he was elevated to the College of Cardinals April 28, 1969.

Roman Catholic Church Gets First Permanent Deacon

The nation's first trained permanent deacon in the Roman Catholic Church will be ordained Sunday, May 24, at 10:45 a.m. in the Shrine Chapel of Our Lady of Orchard Lake Church.

Paul Michael McArdle will be ordained to the permanent diaconate by the Most Rev. Charles W. Helmsing, D.D., bishop of Kansas City-St. Joseph, Mo.

McArdle is one of 18 men who have been undergoing specialized training in a program prescribed by the American bishops at the Orchard Lake Schools' Center for Pastoral Studies.

THE COURSE was organized in 1969 as the country's first full time permanent diaconate program. Normally a two-year training is required, but because of McArdle's extensive seminary training, he was able to fill the requirements in one year.

McArdle, a resident of Kansas City, was born in Holyoke, Mass. He is married and has a son, John Felix, born in August 1968. His wife, Barbara, will take part in his ordination ceremony.

THE RESTORATION of the permanent diaconate is one of the newest responses the Catholic Church has given to the call of its people for service and ministry.

The permanent deacon will be expected to fulfill the church's ministry of service sacramentally, as a builder and as a man of service to all people. He will baptize, preach, distribute communion, officiate at marriages and assist the priest at mass.

The McArdles expect to work in a foreign mission in the near future.

Church To Support Minority Grants

The American Lutheran Church has allotted \$150,000 out of its crisis funds for 1970 to support scholarships for students from minority groups. The scholarships will be in varying amounts and will cover tuition and other costs. They may be used in any accredited institution.

Each percent of the total amount will be used during the first year of the program. The remaining \$60,000 will be used to continue support of students beyond the first year.

The rate of dropout will determine the number of students whose support can be continued from the original funds. It is hoped that further funds will be forthcoming should the continuation of the minority scholarship program be considered a worthwhile program. It would then be possible to grant additional scholarships beyond the initial grant.

The scholarship selection committee will be composed of three representatives from minority groups.

Roberge Heads CYO Division

Edward Roberge of 10014 Graffield, Redford Township, has been named director of the Youth Leadership Division of the Archdiocesan Detroit Catholic Youth Organization.

Roberge, 23 is the youngest division director in the 22-year-old history of the Detroit CYO. He has been director of the CYO Federation of Young Adult Clubs for the past two years.

AS DIRECTOR, he is charged with the guidance of almost 100 part-time and young clubs that have an estimated 10,000 members. Many young adult club members are older than the new director.

As chief of the young adult clubs, Roberge helped to shift the emphasis in the clubs from purely social and sports projects to efforts to help the less fortunate in a wide range of ways.

In his new position, he means to continue to stress the need for service without neglecting the social side of club membership.

"WE MUST address ourselves to areas of urgent concern," he says. "We must accelerate our efforts to resolve such pressing problems as drugs, the draft and the whole range of human relations.

"I favor more direct involvement with the vicarates to build useful programs where none exist now. We must develop leadership at all levels," he concluded.

Roberge is a graduate of Wayne State University with a major in sociology and a minor in psychology.

Prior to joining the CYO staff, he was president of the young adult club in St. Hilary parish in Redford Township.
