Some said their concern stemmed from a lifelong commitment to peace. Others joised the cause at the least misute because of reasons like the break down of the Geneva Arms talks or U.S. troops entering Grenada.

Southfield residents Pat and Corinne Bruder, ages 68 and 59, Joined Pax Christi at St. Ive Catholic Church. Through the peace group, the parents of 12 began "linking along the lines of doing something instead of just thinking."

"It was quite a big decision and sur-prising both of us got the idea at the same time," said Bruder, who saw the blockade as a "somehwat risky and challenging way to draw attention to the need. Maybe people who know us will say 'Hey, maybe we ought to get involved too."




