England has a little war that never ends; it is the war the navy wages against the Arab "blackbird" and gun runners in the Persian gulf, the Red sea and off the coast of Zanzibar, declares an article in the Detroit News. There are only two kinds of commerce to which the Arab takes wholeheartedly—slave trading and gun running. The Arab will pick a herd of unhappy blacks into the hold of a dhow where it is as dark as pitch, absolutely unventilated and hotter than hades and run for a port where he knows a good price is obtainable for "black ivory."

When the hatches are lifted such of the wretched slaves as have survived are marched ashore and sold. The dhow is thrown overboard and the trader goes off after another cargo. Putting down "blackbirding" and gun running is one of the many miscellaneous jobs allotted to the British navy. Sea patrolling is done by ships or boats, according to the locality. Much of it falls to the lot of armed citizens, commanded by an officer and manned by a few bluejackets, which sail about in search of dhows. The Hub of The Problem

Costs are placed in a new light by the whole question of farm electrification. Why is it, many farmers have asked, that it costs more to supply electric service to rural districts than to city homes?
Here is the answer, as summarized by Prof. E. A. Stewart, of the University of Minnesota, project director of the Red Wing experimental line:
1. It rarely distates the customer; thus far has used materially less electricity per month than has the city customer.
2. In the country the average is three customers to the mile, whereas in the city there are from 30 to 200 to the mile.
3. The cost of distributing electricity is everywhere greater than the cost of generating it, in city and country both.
4. If electricity could be generated for nothing the problem of economically supplying it to farms would remain unsolved.

DEZERTILIZER LAKES

Franklin E. Bushman, of Detroit, who owns a large farm in the neighborhood of Upper and Lower Bushman, Whipple, and Crooked lakes in Independence township, is the man who is taking advantage of this natural deposit on the bottoms of the lakes to replenish the supply of lime in soil which has been devoted to the growing of alfalfa and similar crops.

Marl is a mixture of carbonate of lime and clay found on lake bottoms. The presence of the lime is due to the grinding up of small shells, the presence of fish-bones and a certain variety of seaweed known as chara, which causes the deposition of lime carbonate. Occasionally marl is a direct chemical precipitate. It is accumulating in many of the lakes in glaciated areas.

Several Oakland county lakes have extensive marl deposits, while others have none at all, or at least none which can be secured at reasonable cost. Whipple lake where Mr. Bushman is securing a big supply, has large areas covered with marl. A pole has been erected, with block and tackle, and an engine hauls the marl up from the lake bottom in a big bucket.

Fifty or sixty tons of marl already have been removed from the lake and the work has just begun. Crooked lake is said to contain even more extensive deposits, although other lakes nearby have none.

The marl is being produced primarily for Mr. Bushman's own farm, but all that is not needed will be sold. It is being produced at a cost far less than that of crushed limestone.

Marl long has been used as a fertilizer, but this is believed to be the first time it has been removed from Oakland county lakes on a commercial scale—Pontiac Daily Press.
