ROTATION BILLING
GOES INTO EFFECT
The Michigan Bell Telephone
Company will put into effect April I'a new "rotation billing" but on subscription of the rendering of which dates of building to subscription of the property of the bills will to bring all accounts up to the date of billing.

"The term, rotation billing," may not be familiar, but the general plan is well known to most people, for it has been used for some years by gas companies and pewer and light companies," local manager Crow states, 'It simply means that the work of sending out a huge number of bills is divided into parts which are completed at different dates, which leveling out a load which is particularly heavy when the entire job must be completed at one time. "As applied to the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, it means that our monthly bills will be issued in six equal groups, dated the 1st, oth 11th, 16th, 21st, and 26th, and will be mailed as soon as ready after those dates. All subscribers in the local exchange will have the same billing date each month-the 21st; The new plan will be extended to inclde all other exchanges, which are handled by the Grand Rapids accounting center, about Nov.!"

"The new plan will tend to keep expenses and administration problems at a reasonable point. All subacribers will benifit from the fact that under rotation billing, bills, will carry all charges and and credits up to the date they bear; and will reach them very shortly after that date, so enabling easier understanding and checking of the bills, while in the past the company has attempted to apply credits up to the date of the bills, we will be able to extend that time and frequently apply, credits for two days after the date of the bills.
