Why Blood Rusts.

If a piece of iron is left out in the damp it soon becomes rusty; a red layer forms on its surface and in time the rust will cut so deeply into the metal that it becomes as brittle as glass.

What happens when iron rusts? Simply this: the air contains a very active gas called oxygen, which combines eagerly with many substances. First is a combination of iron and oxygen. Most metals oxidize, as the process is called. Copper and brass become green, silver turns black, whilst nickel takes on a yellow tinge. Even an apple will turn brown when in a very short time when cut open.

The curious thing is that we live entirely by means of the process of rusting oxidation. You may have noticed that though fresh blood is bright red it soon turns brown when exposed to the air; in doing so it is simply rusting. For oxygen combines very readily with blood.

Inside a man's lungs are thousands and thousands of tiny blood vessels whose walls are so thin that air can penetrate them. As we breathe air into the lungs it is brought into contact with this blood coursing through these fine channels. The oxygen of the air combines with the blood and is carried off by the stream which is pumped by the heart to every part of the body.

During its passage the blood gives up its oxygen and receives carbonic acid gas, the waste product of the muscles. On reaching the lungs it discharges the waste and takes on a fresh supply of life-giving oxygen by the process of rusting.
