TASTY EATING

Those who know, tell us that a duck should never be stuffed if one likes all the flavor in the bird.

Brussels Duck—Lay three slices of fat, smoked ham upon the grating of the roaster; next, a minced onion, a stalk of celery, chopped, a sliced carrot and a tablespoonful of chopped parsley. Clean and truss the ducks, lay them upon the vegetables and pour a cupful of hot water over them. Cover the roaster closely and cook in a moderate oven for two hours. Take up the ducks, strain the liquor from the pan and let it cool sufficiently to congeal the fat. Skin the greaves carefully and return to the fire in a saucepan, keeping the ducks hot over boiling water closely covered. Roll the greaves; add a teaspoonful of lemon juice and thicken slightly with flour. Have the cooked giblets chopped and stir into the gravy. Pour this sauce again over the ducks in the roaster, bring all to the boiling point and serve with the sauce poured round the fowls. Serve with apple sauce or currant jelly.

Fish Turbot—Take one can of salmon, remove the skin and bones and flake into small pieces. Make a dressing of one-half cupful of butter, add enough cold milk to make a paste, then turn it into a pint of hot milk and cook until it is smooth and thick. Cook, add two well-beaten eggs, one-half cupful of melted butter and season to taste. Put the fish and dressing in alternate layers and cover with buttered crumbs and bake one-half hour. The liquor may be used for part of the fat in the sauce if desired.

Every-Day Cake—Beat four tablespoonfuls of butter to a cream; add one-half cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of raisins, two egg yolks beaten light, one-quarter cupful each of maple and corn syrup, one-half cupful of oil and one of these articles cupfuls of flour, a teaspoonful of cream of tartar, half a teaspoonful of soda and the pinch of salt and mix, all sifted together. Add the stiffly-beaten whites of eggs and turn into a shallow tin. Sprinkle with chopped nuts and drudge with sugar. Bake one hour or longer, depending upon the depth of the mixture.

SOMETHING TO EAT

A dainty salad accompaniment is prepared with the tender centers of white celery, stuffed with a seasoned cream cheese or with a grated cheese softened in hot cream and seasoned lightly with paprika and any desired seasoning.

Savory Sandwich Filling—Finely chop one-half cupful of almonds and brown them in a frying pan with a tablespoonful of oil. Chop fine, season with salt and cayenne, add two chopped pickles, one tablespoonful of minced onion and an equal amount of either bread or crackers with cream cheese and sprinkle with the chopped mixture.

Stuffed Egg Plant—Parboil a large egg plant, unpeeled, for ten minutes at least until perfectly cold. Cut one-half lengthwise and scrape out the center, leaving the walls an inch in thickness. Chop the pulp fine; add to it half a cupful of melted butter, salt and pepper to taste. Moisten with milk and all the hollowed halves with the mixture, rounding up the stuffing. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake in a covered roaster, pouring enough butter and water around the vegetable to come half way up the sides. When well cooked transfer to a hot platter, thicken the liquor left in the roaster with browned flour and butter, boil up and pour around the egg plant.

Green Peppers Stuffed With Rice—Cut a slice from the stem ends of green peppers; lay into cold water after cutting and let them stand for ten minutes, turning that they may be evenly cleaned. Fill with canned chicken soup, rice, cooked chicken, chopped nuts or any good, moist filling, arranging in a nicely seasoned stuffing.

Mashed Potatoes—Boil the potatoes until tender; drain and shake over the heat to dispel all steam. Beat until light, adding butter and hot milk; give another good beating with a strong, large spoon and serve with white and delicious. Do not, when serving, masher potatoes, push into a dish and press down. Leave light, just as it comes from the spoon.

Potato Cakes—Add one beaten egg to two cups of mashed potato, two tablespoonfuls of milk, salt and pepper to taste. Mix well and form into ten balls, using flour to roll. Fasten a thin slice of bacon around each with a toothpick to hold the bacon in place. Bake in a hot oven and cook until the bacon is crisp. Serve at once.

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Hillsdale—Slightly fresh eggs declined to a record low price for many years here when they were retailed in the open market at 19 cents a dozen.

Owosso—A contract for the construction of the new city hall has been awarded to the Henry C. Webster Construction Co. of Bay City. Its bid for the general contract was \$23,850.

Detroit—Three hundred and fifty members of the Brooklyn chapter of the Commercial Union of Detroit celebrated the Fourth of July. They will stop on their way to Duluth during the second annual cruise of the organization.

Detroit—The economic importance of the Commercial Union of Detroit water project will be emphasized in one of the numerous educational exhibits to be shown at the Michigan Industrial exposition in Convention Hall, May 3, to 17.

East Lansing—With the receipt of the entry of the R. O. C. Horse Show at the Michigan Agricultural College, May 30 and 31, is assuming proportions which rank it with the largest events of the type in the state.

Monroe—Motarists in the vicinity of Carleton, 10 miles north of Monroe, are riding on free gasoline these days. "A tank car filled with gasoline" derailed and the gas was pumped into a steady stream. Residents quickly secured pans, milk cans and other containers and carried it away.

Pontiac—Traffic officers of Pontiac will begin a drive against defective brakes on automobiles. All motor cars that he stopped and the brakes of their cars tested. Those which pass inspection will bring a card of approval for the owner while others will be required to repair them at once or lose their driver's licenses.

Charlotet—The lives of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Barlow, of Kalamo Township, were saved by a book agent who called at their house, looked in the window and saw the two sitting in the chair, apparently sleeping, and then broke in and found the two had been overcome by coal gas. They were taken into the air and revived.

East Lansing—Michigan potatoes grown by starting potatoes of poor quality, according to H. C. Moore, potato specialist for the Michigan Agricultural College Extension Division. "The market demands high quality stock," declared Moore, "and our producers must grow the kind the market wants."

Detroit—The council has approved the ordinance requiring the vaccination of all dogs against rabies. This action was taken upon report of Dr. Henry F. Vaughan, health commissioner, who presented statistics intended to prove that there is a great danger of persons suffering from hydrophobia as a result of being bitten by dogs at this time.

Grand Rapids—A freight car loaded with imported liquor was seized by Federal prohibition agents in the Grand Trunk Railway yards here. The cargo, valued by Mr. Davis at \$20,000, is \$25,000, is one of the richest seizures made by prohibition agents in some time. The car was billed from a fictitious firm in Seabright, N. J., to a fictitious firm in Grand Rapids as "auto dealers."

Detroit—Heretofore, the minimum bail for prisoners, brought before J. Stanley Hurd, United States Commissioner, will be \$2,000. In making this announcement, Mr. Hurd said the step was necessitated by the frequency with which Federal prisoners, particularly of the bootlegging fraternity—have, of late, forfeited the \$1,000 bonds under which it has been his general practice to place them while awaiting trial.

Fruitland—Clifford W. Ham, city manager of Gladstone, Mich., and former city clerk here, has been appointed city manager of Pontiac at a salary of \$6,500 a year. The appointment was made by the city commission from a list of 13 candidates. He succeeds Irving C. Browner, who resigned rather than demand at the request of the commission, the immediate resignation of the Thurman, quoted chief of police.

Grand Rapids—Drastic action against autoturban bus operators violating the State truck weight limitation was taken last week when deputy sheriff stopped buses and compelled several of the passengers to walk to their destinations or to interurban stations. Operators have threatened to discontinue service because of the enforcement of the ruling which limits some large buses to 13 passengers and others to ten or six.

Lansing—Large publication of the legal notices of the judgment of a court issued against the House of David has been filed by the state, and the clerk of the Michigan county circuit court. This step paves the way for the filing of a petition by the state attorney general's department, asking for appointment of a receiver for the Boston Harbor office. The big legal fight to oust the colony from Michigan then will be under way, according to O. L. Smith, assistant attorney general.

Triangular Wheels

The carts that travel the rocky road to Dublin would have a much rougher time of it if their wheels were like those that the Mogollan peasant uses on his ox cart. The two wheels, says Mr. A. S. Kent in "Old Farther Trails," are unprotected by iron tires, and therefore with constant use over stony roads they soon lose their roundness and become first pentagonal, then hexagonal and then septagonal, so that what the Moorish begins to think that he ought to have new wheels; but before his caravan has reached a place where he can find a Chinese to make the wheels he has passed the rectangular stage and have become triangular, and the vehicle will go no farther.

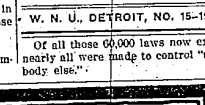

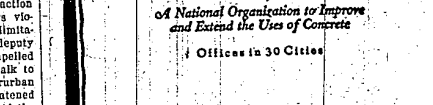
