TIENEST BOOK OWNED BY WALLED LAKE LADY

The Walled Lake correspondent to the Pontiac Press says:

One of the smallest books in existence is in possession of Miss Lute Hoyt of Walled Lake.

It is a bible history printed in 1813. It is two inches long and one and one-quarter inches wide and three-fourths of an inch thick. It is leather covered and has 238 pages, and though yellow with age the print is very plain.

On the fly leaf was written "Hiram Barrett, Born 1799. This book was given to him by his mother when he was a small child."

Hiram Barrett was the grandfather of Miss Hoyt, and was one of the first settlers here. He and his father took 200 acres of land from the government and built the first frame house in this vicinity. It was on the Pontiac road on what is now the Garner farm.

ANNA CAIRNS POTTER
