IN A LETTER to parents of children in the orthopedic program, Theodore F. Cuno, director of special education, says the district will offer a two-week session at Forest Elementary School, 34545 Old Timber Rd.

"We will make up for the two weeks loss of school by offering a summer program for your child," Cuno says.

"We will be still without some of our major pieces of equipment. However, Douglas Smith, supervisor for the orthopedic program assured me a meaningful program will still be able to be offered.

"The orthopedic staff attempts to instill in your youngster that nothing is impossible. What they are doing now in their plans for the summer program is using this same motto planning for your youngster.

THE FIRE destroyed one room of the orthopedic center and smoke and water damage occurred in the other four rooms.
