STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Alpena—Gerald Eaton, air electrician at the Fletcher Paper Co., fell 20 feet from a pole, suffering a fractured skull.

Battle Creek—Edwin C. Nichols, 76, pioneer president of the Nichols & Shepard Threshing Machine Co. here, is dead after a short illness.

Port Huron—A marine freight line is now in operation between Port Huron and Saginaw and Bay City, the Port Huron Terminal Co. has announced. The steamer Rolling will make weekly trips between these ports.

Saginaw—Robert R. Wasyluk, 39 years old, a veteran of nine years' service in the navy, residing alone on a little farm near Freeland, was killed instantly when a charge of dynamite being used, to blast stumps accidentally exploded.

Petoskey—Petoskey's proposed new city charter, providing a new plan for selection of city officials, has received the approval of Gov. Alex. J. Groesbeck. If the voters approve it, Petoskey will be the first city to adopt the pre-primary convention plan of nomination.

Flint—Alphonse R. Dubois, Flint contractor, was awarded a judgment of \$92,537.09 against the defunct Commonwealth corporation in the Genesee circuit court, the largest award in the history of the county. The corporation failed to complete a building contract with Dubois.

Detroit—A verdict of \$11,393.75 has been awarded to Bernard Cole, 6-year-old son of Nicholas J. Cole, against the Wagner Baking Co. The boy lost the sight of one eye and is said to be losing the sight of the other as a result of being struck down by a delivery truck belonging to the baking company.

Pontiac—Charles Sewell, 66, a farmer living three miles west of Orion, was drowned when he fell into an old well on the farm. His body was discovered by his wife. Sewell was subject to heart attacks and is believed to have fallen into the well while suffering from a dizzy spell. He leaves a widow and three children.

Detroit—A jury awarded a verdict of \$7,500 in favor of Allan Campbell, a plasterer, against the Haughton Electric & Machinery Co. of Toledo, on the grounds that the company's negligence was responsible for the crushing of the plaintiff's head and shoulder by a falling weight in the elevator shaft of a downtown department store. He asked \$10,000.

Pontiac—A 15-foot fall from a step ladder on which he was standing in an attempt to put awnings on the second story windows of his home, resulted fatally for Richard E. Cragg, 43 years old, assistant chief inspector of the Wilson Foundry and Machine Co. He hit on his head, fracturing his skull, and died in a few minutes. He leaves his widow and two sons.

Detroit—Parlor car service on the D. U. R. between Detroit and Flint has been discontinued. Two specially built parlor cars have been added to the line, making three daily trips each way. Each has been equipped with 23 overstuffed, movable chairs, nine of which are placed in the smoking room. Each car is in addition to a motorman and conductor, is under the care of a porter.

Monroe—McNroe's Masonic lodge realized a dream when the formal opening of the Masonic Temple took place recently. Several years ago McNroe purchased the National Guard armory and since last September the work of remodeling has been under way. The building has been remodeled to suit their needs. The value of the building, grounds and equipment is estimated at \$150,000.

Battle Creek—The whining of a dog probably saved the lives of six persons when the farm home of J. W. Partidge, south of Battle Creek, was totally destroyed by flames. Mrs. Partidge was awakened by the dog and upon opening the bedroom door found the fire raging. While helping her husband and four children out of the house, she was thrown into the basement when the floor of the living room gave way. She escaped with slight injuries.

Port Huron—When the board of supervisors met the last week in June the county road commission will ask for an appropriation to purchase equipment and to meet the expense of snow removal from highways during the winter months. During the past winter roads in the Thumb section were closed several times by heavy falls of snow. Some residents and officials believed that it was up to the county highway department or the state highway department to take care of snow removal.

Lansing—Sophomore and Junior Agricultural students at Michigan Agricultural College are to spend four weeks on the property of the Johannesburg Manufacturing company, of Johannesburg, Mich., this summer, as a part of their course. At the camp the students will gain first-hand knowledge of practical lumbering operations from the time the trees are marked until they are loaded on cars for shipment, after being cut into lumber, as the company owns a saw mill and much wooded property around the village.

A DOZEN DON'TS

Don't let food dry on the baking dishes; set them at once into the sink and cover with water, but not for grease and cold food. Don't let dishes which have been used with eggs. Don't pour boiling water over china or glass; it may not crack at the time, but it will drop off in pieces when least expected.

Don't forget to dash over a spot of grease (spilled on wooden table) with a cupful of cold water. It will conquer the grease and the most of it may be removed at once.

Don't use table silver for cooking around the stove; silver utensils may be bought for such purposes.

Don't lay greasy spoons or utensils on the table or stove. Keep a tin plate or small tray to hold such things; this will save cleaning and scouring the table.

Don't pour boiling water on cup towels or dishcloths that have any grease about them; wash them in cold water first with a little soda or ammonia soap; then wash in hot water and boil.

Don't put tin dishes away without seeing that they are perfectly dry. Don't use steel knives or forks on dishes; it gives an unpleasant flavor.

Don't salt meat before cooking; wait until it is well-seared over to hot in juices and extractions.

Don't blacken a stove while hot, if at all. Simply wipe it off with a cloth reserved for that purpose and wring out of greasy dishwater. Such treatment will keep a stove in the condition it wiped twice a day.

Don't forget to use hot compresses of witch hazel on a stiff neck as soon as possible. Put a few tablespoonfuls of witch hazel into a shallow dish and lay in a cloth folded in several thicknesses, keeping it hot at the top of the range. A few applications will bring relief.

Don't forget to put all bloodstained garments into cold water. If a fresh spot of blood is dropped on a woollen garment cover it at once with dry starch. The starch will absorb the blood and may be brushed out when dry.

TASTY DISHES

If you are fond of sweet potatoes the following will be a dish you will cherish:

Sweet Potatoes de Luxe.—Boil six medium-sized potatoes until well done. Cut into slices lengthwise and arrange in a buttered platter. Sprinkle with a tablespoonful of sugar and dot with bits of butter. Pour over one cupful of pineapple juice, sprig with a teaspoonful of sugar and dot with bits of butter. Bake one-half hour, keeping covered the first half of the time. When done garnish with marshmallows and return to the oven to puff and brown. Serve at once.

China Chills.—Cut into small pieces two pounds of the neck of lamb, dice, curdling the fat. Soak one cupful of lima beans. Take one head of lettuce, two sliced stalks two cups of boiling water and salt and pepper to season. Soak the beans overnight, add them to the meat and vegetables and simmer until the meat is tender—about three hours.

Coffee Marshmallow Cream.—Soak two tablespoonfuls of gelatin in two tablespoonfuls of cold water until soft. Add two cupfuls of strong, boiling hot coffee and stir until the gelatin is dissolved. Add one-fourth of a cupful of sugar, one cupful of condensed milk, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla and one-fourth of a pound of marshmallows. Let the mixture just before chilling. Cut the marshmallows into quarters with scissors. If the blades of the scissors are buttered they will cut without sticking.

Peanut Cakes.—Cut rounds from sponge or a plain butter cake; soak with a tablespoonful of the juice from a can of peaches and lay on halves of other fresh fruit, canned peaches, the hollow with sweetened, flavored whipped cream and sprinkle with chopped almonds. Almond favoring for the cream is very good.

Rochester Chocolate Cake.—Cream one cupful of a cupful of butter, add one cupful of sugar gradually, two squares of chocolate melted, two eggs well beaten, one-half cupful of milk, one and one-half cupfuls of flour, mixed and sifted with three teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Beat well, add a teaspoonful of vanilla and bake in a moderate oven forty-five minutes.

Small gem sponge cakes, filled with whipped cream or any desired filling which may be prepared just before serving, are most delicious as dessert.

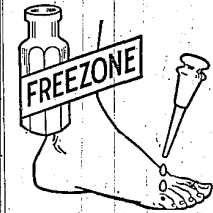
